Seventh grade girls beat Hoxie

The Grant Junior High seventh grade volleyball teams beat Hoxie Thursday, Sept. 11, at home and won five out of six matches at their home tournament Saturday.

The Goodland A Team beat Hoxie 25-16 and 25-14 with 71 percent serving in the first game (17/24) and 72 percent (18/25) in the second. Serving leaders were Ellie House with 13 points and Brianna White with 6.

Goodland's B Team won 25-10 and 25-19 with 79 percent serving in the first game (19/24) and 76 percent (19/25) in the second game. Bracelyn Redlin with 12 points and Breanna Garrett with 9 were the serving leaders.

"We are showing steady improvement and are starting to serve better," said Coach Andy Scheopner. "I've been really pleased with the way we have started the season and how hard these girls are working."

In the tournament, Goodland's A Team lost to Scott City 25-13 and 29-27 with 69 percent serving (9/13) in the first game and 72 percent (18/25) in the second. Serving leaders were Berkley White with 6 and Megan Siruta with 4.

The A Team beat Norton 25-11 and 25-23 and Colby 25-22 and 25-19. Against Norton, their serving percentage as 92 percent (22/24) in the first game and 79 percent (19/24) in the second. Serving leaders were Berkley White with 14 points, House with 7 and Brianna White with 6.

Against Colby, Goodland's serving percentage was 76 (19/25) and 79 (19/24). Serving leaders were Gabby Rangel and Mara Kling, both with seven.

"It was a good day for us," Scheopner said. "In our first game, we didn't play well and really struggled with our serves and passing the ball. In the second game, we came to life! We passed the ball really well and did a really good job of setting it up and spiking the ball."

In the third game against Colby, he said, they came in winning all their games that day. The Grant Junior High girls came out and really played well, he said, especially setting the ball up for spikes.

"I was really pleased with our day going 2-1," the coach said. "We need to improve our serving, but our ball skills are really improving."

The B Team beat Scott City 25-20

and 25-22 with 73 percent serving (19/26) in the first game and 71 percent (17/24) in the second. Serving leaders were Amber Smith with 11 points and Milan Brannick with 5.

The Lady Mustangs beat Norton 25-20 and 25-21 with 68 percent serving (17/25) and 83 percent (20/24). Bracelyn Redlin with 13 points and Amber Perdew with 7 were the serving leaders.

Goodland beat Wray, Colo., 25-21 and 25-15 with 68 percent serving (17/25) and 96 percent (24/25) Brannick with 10 and Breanna Garrett and Jordan Knitig, each with 6, were the serving leaders.

"We came in and played really well all day long," Scheopner said. "Our serving needs to keep improving, but our volleying and net play has really gotten a lot better. I was really pleased on going 3-0 on the day. With this group of girls, practice is really good because there is a lot of competition."

were to Shoaff of Colby 7-3 and to Wiesner of Hays High Maroon in a tie break 7-6 (7-4).

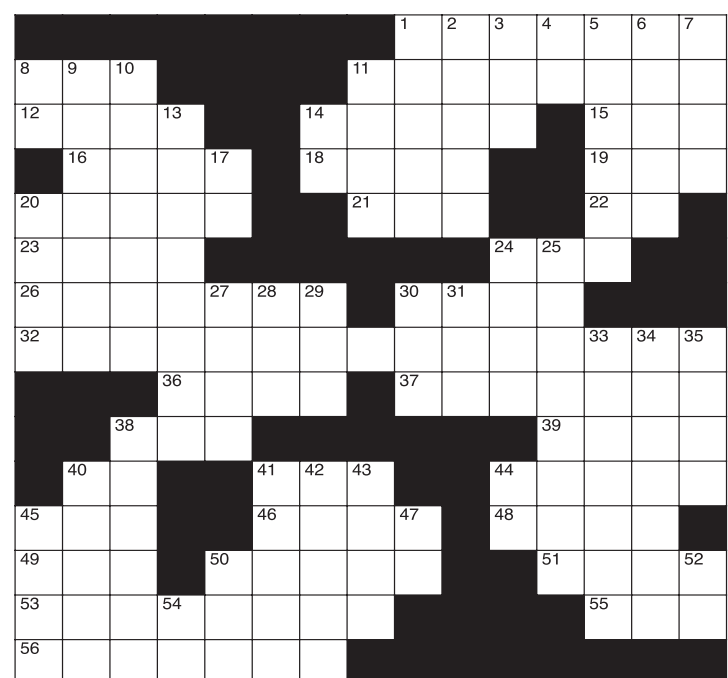
