## Cowboys end Indians' shut-out streak

The Cowboys began the game against St. Francis minus two members of their regular starting line up due to illness, as sophomore Nathan Deeds, wide receiver and linebacker, and junior Jay Cotter, offensive line and defensive line, were both under the weather. Cotter did play part of the game, but senior Vance Johnson replaced him in the opening line up, while sophomore Kelly Pearson replaced Deeds.

The Indians won the coin toss and elected to start on defense. Sophomore Devon Garrett returned the kick, and the Cowboys started on the 32 yard line. Senior Fernando Martinez ran the first two plays for short gains, and on third and five, senior Travis Angelos threw an incomplete bass. Goodiand punted.

For the Indians, quarterback Matt Raile, a junior, handed off frequently to his cousin Trent Raile, also a junior, and the combination resulted in a lot of yards. St. Francis also made liberal use of the fake,



> Goodland got the first down at the 20, then on the next play, Rome tried to dive for Angelos' pass at the goal line, but it fell incomplete. The next pass to Rome moved the Cowboys up to first and goal at the nine. Rome broke tackles but was met by a tribe, and Goodland was at second and goal at the 10.

> A Goodland penalty backed the Cowboys up to second and goal at the 15. A pass to Oharah gained Goodland 10 yards. At third and goal at the five, an incomplete pass to Rome left the Cowboys at fourth and goal. On the next pass, though, Rome got the touchdown. The extra point failed, but Goodland was on the scoreboard.
