

Lady Mustangs win two

The seventh grade Grant Junior High Lady Mustangs volleyball A-Team won matches at Oakley and Oberlin, while the B-Team lost both. The girls are preparing for the league tournament Thursday.

The Lady Mustangs A-Team beat Oakley 25-23, 25-21 Thursday, Oct. 2. Their serving was 84 percent, 21/25, and 78 percent, 14/18. Serving leaders were Gabby Rangel and Berkley White.

The B-Team lost 25-17, 26-24 with 89 percent serving, 16/18, and 81 percent serving, 21/26. Serving leaders were Sonya Garza, Jordan Knitig and Breanna Garrett.
"We are really starting to do a good job of setting it up and getting good sets and spikes," said Coach Andy Scheopner. "We had 12 kills in the first match, so our net play is getting better every time out."

The A-Team beat Oberlin 25-22, 25-14 Thursday with 74 percent serving, 17/23, and 78 percent serving, 18/23. Serving leaders were

Berkley White, Brianna White and Bracelyn Redlin.

The B-Team lost 25-23, 25-17 with 68 percent serving, 15/22, and 69 percent serving, 11/16. Serving leaders were Milan Brannick and Garrett.

"This was probably our best game as far as volleying the ball," Scheopner said. "We had several outstanding saves. Our serving was not quite what we want, and I hope we can improve on that as we get ready for our league tournament in Oberlin Thursday."

Mustang runners finish season

The Grant Junior High Mustangs and Lady Mustangs finished their cross country season Saturday at Lakin, running in chilly weather with a light rain.

The Lady Mustangs had one runner finish in the top half, and the Mustangs had three runners finish in the middle of the pack.

Eighth grader Chantel Coates was 30th out of 67 runners, finishing the one-mile race in 7 minutes, 22.47 seconds. Eighth grader Gloria Bustillos finished 61st in 8:41.55, and seventh grader Taylor Ratcliff finished 65th in 9:29.34. The winning time was 6:11.69.

In the boys' race, eighth grader Tyler Rabey finished 68th out of 125 runners in 6:53.84. Eighth grader Jacob Schnabel finished 73rd in 6:59.27, seventh grader Ace Artega 74th in 7:00.07, seventh grader Jesse Cooper 106th in 7:33.56 and seventh grader Jarod Lake 115th in 8:04.67.

They ran a mostly flat course with a long, shallow slope on the east side. Runners from Abe Hubert (Garden City), Cimarron, Dodge City, Elkhart, Greeley County (Tribune), Hugoton, Liberal South, Syracuse, Liberal West, Rolla Middle School, Wichita County (Leoti), Kepley Middle School, Stanton County, Hugoton and Sublette competed.

This was a really huge meet, especially on the boys side, said Coach Ben Foust — the start was really tough with 125 boys on the line, and

Ace took a nasty spill somewhere after the 100-meter mark.

"I didn't see it," the coach said, "but he was certainly hurting, and the kids behind him said it was a pretty impressive fall. So, obviously, Ace didn't get the final race he'd hoped for, but he struggled back to finish just barely over seven minutes. Ace is a true competitor who has a lot of untapped potential. He did well Saturday and gave his best. I'm proud of his dedication."

Jacob ran a great race, finishing just under seven minutes, Foust said; this was the second time he's been under seven this year. Tyler led the boys team after Ace's fall and finished with his best time of the year, the coach said; this was his second race under seven this year.

"I couldn't be happier with his determination and great finish to the season," Foust said.

Jesse has literally had a very up and down season, the coach said; he ran well on Saturday in the mid-sevens — although it was just a little short of his goal time, he did a great job of fighting through the crowd to finish as well as he did.

Jarod has continued to improve each meet (except McCook), the coach said — if you look at his times on a line graph, it's very linear.

There were fewer runners in the girls' race, he said, but the competition was just as tough.

Chantel continued her streak of finishing at least in the top half, Foust said; she has either medalled or finished almost exactly in the middle every race. Chantel has been

so close to running under seven minutes that she could taste it, he said — she has done an amazing job being an eighth grade leader and working hard to achieve her goal, which she thought was impossible.

Gloria only ran in three races all season, the coach said, but she picked the toughest three races. She is a tough competitor, he said, and has been a lot of fun to have out on the team.

"I'm looking forward to big things from her next year as a freshman," Foust said. "She did great Saturday running her best time of the season."

Taylor is another one who has consistently improved each race (except McCook), Foust said — she finished with her best time of the season as well. She was hoping to be under nine minutes for the season, he said, but still ended up dropping a minute, 20 seconds, from her first race.

"She has done an excellent job in learning how to run," Foust said — "now we'll teach her to race next year."

"I am sad to see the season come to a close," he said. "We have worked really hard and had a great season. We set some lofty but attainable goals. Most of us have achieved those goals, and those who didn't are left wanting more."

"I can't think of a better way to end the season than with students wanting more and talking about next year. I think that there is going to be a good future for cross country at Grant Junior High and Goodland High School."

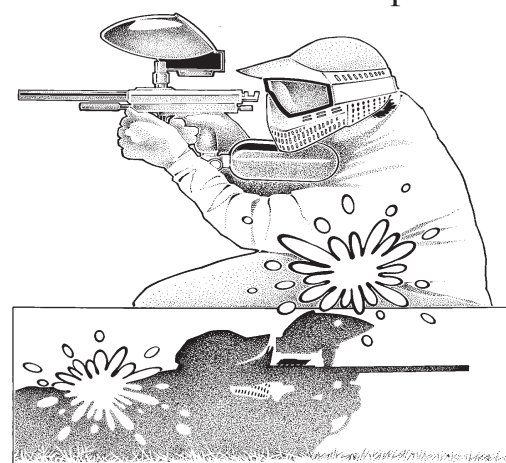
