Commissioner Praeger said the department is working with the corporation's appointed special master and staff regarding contractual concerns between the corporation and its franchisees. The insurance department does not have regulatory oversight in those contractual matters, she said.

However, Praeger said that customers who paid premiums to those agents and agencies are considered to have coverage.
