City accepts low bid for roof

Saying he does not like flat roofs Mayor Rick Billinger was the lone vote against the low bid from Roofmasters Roofing of Colby for replacing the roof on the building at the city power plant over the control room and offices at the meeting last Monday.

The low bid from Roofmasters of \$15,188 was approved on a 4-1 vote with the other bid being from Weathercraft Companies of Goodland for \$18,195.

Rod Blake, power plant superintendent, said the roof in question was installed in 1992, and was a rubberized roof that was pulling away from the walls and could not be repaired any more.

He said the two companies were bidding the same type of roofing.

Billinger asked if there was any way to put a peak on that roof.

"We are talking about putting a patch on it to last 10 to 12 years and be right back here," he said. "I am not in favor of flat roofs."
