At-large mock election planned Tuesday

nt.betz@nwkansas.com Sherman County citizens will have a chance to vote on the issue of at-large voting of county commissioners in a mock election planned for Election Day, Tuesday, at the Goodland Activity Center.

Trevor Linton, chairman of the Shine On Sherman County Government Alliance Committee was at Goodland Rotary on Friday to talk about the plans for the mock election on the at-large commissioner issue and another public forum planned for Dec. 2.

Linton said the committee had been asked by the Sherman County commissioners to hold more than one public forum on the issue. They held a public forum at the Northwest Kansas District Free Fair in August.

He said the committee was looking for another time to do a public forum, but felt with the harvest and school events the mock election would be a good way to get the citizens to express their opinion on the issue.

The mock election will be the same day as the General Election on Tuesday. He said under state law the

Rumpel said Sherman County has about 3,570 registered voters, and the 1,220 who have voted early or requested ballots are 34 percent of the total of registered voters.

Voting on Tuesday for all Sherman County will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Veterans of Foreign Wars at 824 Main, and Rumpel said voting machines will be available for who may need special help.

The only local contest is in County Commissioner District 2 where Republican Cynthia Strnad is facing incumbent Democrat Mitch Tiede.

In District 3 Republican Max Linin is running unopposed. Other county offices where the candidates are running unopposed include Republican Janet Rumpel for county clerk, Republican Iris Scheopner for county treasurer, Republican Billie Hoyt for register of deeds, Republican Bonnie Selby for county attorney and Republican Kevin Butts for sheriff.
