City manager drafts nitrate proposal

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In his last manager's report, City Manager Wayne Hill told the commissioners he had drafted a proposal to be sent out to get responses from several places for handling the nitrate problems in the city wells.

Hill said the man from the U.S. Department of Agriculture has seeded several areas with corn, and he was not going to poison the birds before Thanksgiving.

"I assume he is going to be back out here,"

Commissioner John Garcia said he had talked to the man and he was going to follow up. He said he has some businesses where he will be putting the poison.

Hill said the agriculture man said any animal that might eat a dead pigeon is not the city buy one a month and put it up. He
