ties, but not going out and investigating cases for other law enforcement offices.

She said there are three cases where the investigator has been handling the cases including one at the request of the Attorney General's office.

The commissioners went into a closed door session with Pianalto. Selby and Butts to discuss the specifics of his duties and specifics of his case load for 30 minutes.

revised permit application from Sunflower Electric for construction of an 895 megawatt coal-fired electrical generating unit in Holcomb.

The coal-fired power plant project has been revised several times as it started with a plan for three 600 megawatt plants, and that was pared down to two plants last year. However, the state would not approve the permit and the state legislature

Upon completion of a thorough review, the permit will be drafted and made available for public comment through a series of public hearings and solicitation of written comments. More information on the public comment process will be forthcoming.

After the public comment period, KDHE will address any concerns and make revisions as necessary to prepare the permit for final issuance.
