Commissioners tell tenants to sign or move out

nt.betz@nwkansas.com County commissioners decided Friday to have the people renting space in the building at 17th and Broadway sign the leases and be current by today or consider themselves evicted.

County Attorney Bonnie Selby told the commissioners this issue was not something she had planned, but she had been given a check and an envelope of money on Thursday from the two tenants.

Selby said she had a check from Marilyn Bohl, owner of Sew What, that would bring her current from July with a \$100 deduction. She said the envelope from Cynthia Bohl, owner of the 17th Street Barbershop, had \$1,050 to be applied to her rent that would pay part of what she owed from July. She said Cynthia Bohl was short of being current by \$950.

The leases that were drafted in September remain unsigned Selby said, and now both tenants have penciled in other changes and neither has signed a lease.

Commissioner Chuck Thomas asked if Selby had read the penciled additions.

Commissioner Cynthia Strnad asked if the county was treating other taxpayers the same if they are in arrears, and asked if the county paid the utilities.

Selby said the county does pay the utilities.

She said Marilyn Bohl had said someone wants to rent a part of the building and Bohl said she would collect the rent and pass it on to the county.

Strand said she felt the county had gone far enough and felt the two should sign the lease by Jan. 29 or be evicted.

She said the same for the 17th Street Barbershop that is she does not get current and sign lease she is evicted.

Strnad made a motion including the lease and being current or be evicted by Feb. 15, seconded by Commissioner Max Linin. The motion passed 3-0 with Thomas voting in favor.

The commissioners asked that Selby contact the person looking to rent space and have them come to the commissioner meeting Friday morning

"Eight hours is eight hours," he said. "It does not make a change in what they work."

He said the Smoky Hill person was asking about the south portion of the project, and was afraid there might be a problem.

Way said the Smoky Hill person was asking if the county commissioners wanted them to continue working when possible or to wait until later to complete the piece of County Road 14 south of the intersection to the bridge.

Way said the Smoky Hill person said they had not talked to the engineering firm.

Darin Neufeld, engineer for the project from Evans, Bierly, Hutchinson and Associates said Wednesday the state project from the intersection north to County Road 65 had a time limit, but the section south of old U.S. 24 does not have a specific deadline.
