# Board votes 6-1 to close North

Board President Jane Philbrick invited anyone who wished to speak to do so. She said speakers would have three minutes and when everyone had their chance to speak if anyone had more to say

the Town Hall meeting on Monday, March 8, to talk about what to do with the North Elementary School

Former teacher Shari Taylor was the first to speak. She supported moving the junior high into the high school and said many schools in the area have kindergarten to the 12th grade all in one building — such as Brewster. The junior high and high school kids mix together all year long, she said, in places such as 4-H, the Goodland Activities Center and even at the theater.

She wondered why the board hired an architect from Horst, Terrill and Karst Architects of Topeka and then ignored the recommendation of moving the junior high to the high school. Taylor wanted to know what happened to keeping kids first and thought there was more support to close Grant Junior High than North Elementary School.

Dale Stephens spoke next. He told the school board that they need to step up and make decisions. Older people in town want to educate kids. He also reminded the board that kids

"We have a facility that is known as Soldiers Memorial Park," Emig said. "It has been a body of water, but we do not have water now. I believe the county could do lots of other things for the area such as walking trail and improvements to the picnic area.

Dean Atteberry, fuel sales representative for the company, said he had contacted Curt Way, public works manger about bidding on the bulk fuel sales. Atteberry said he understood from talking to Way the county does not have any bulk sales. He said he talked to Sheriff Kevin Butts about getting fuel for his vehicles at a different location.

Emig said he did not feel there would ever be water without having a well.

Thomas said he thought a lot of people come through and use the park for camping, and knew some Boy Scouts had used the area for camping during the summer.

'Water isn't everything," Emig said."You look around and some of the other counties have made their areas usable."

He said Oberlin was in partnership with Pheasants Forever to help develop habitat around their lake. He said Pheasants Forever had donated a couple thousand dollars to help with that development and a man was to be hired to work on the habitat.

Emig said he was not on the board now, but had been on the board for about 20 years. He said the county has playground equipment down at the park, and there are many ways the area could be improved.

"We need to develop it to be usable even without the water," Thomas said. "We will get the board to come in and talk about what can be done.'
