

Cowgirls end season with loss at Hoxie

The Goodland Cowgirls closed out their regular season action against the Hoxie Indians last Friday evening at Hoxie, suffering a 60-44 setback. That gave Coach Andy Scheopner's Cowgirls a 10-10 regular season finish.

The Cowgirls will play at 6 p.m. (Mountain Time) on Tuesday at Holcomb in sub-state action. Goodland is seeded sixth in the tournament and Holcomb third. The winner of that game will play either Hays Thomas More Prep or Larned on Friday.

At the end of the first quarter, Hoxie led 10-7. They maintained their lead at halftime, 26-20. By the end of the third quarter Hoxie still maintained its seven point lead, 40-33. The Lady Indians picked up steam in the fourth quarter widening their lead to 16 points.

The leading Cowgirl scorer was Ashley Archer with 19 points. She made one of five three-point shots, five of 12 baskets and six of seven

free throws. Archer also had three offensive rebounds and nine defensive rebounds for a total of 12. She had two steals.

Jade Herl had eight points in the game. She made two of two baskets, none of her three-point shots and four of four free throws. Herl had one offensive rebound and four defensive rebounds for a total of five. She also had one steal.

Paige Phillips had six points. She made three of eight baskets. Phillips had three offensive rebounds and one defensive rebound for a total of four.

Christy Studer also had six points. She made two of five baskets and two of four free throws. Studer also made one defensive rebound.

Alexis Bateman made one of six baskets and one of two free throws for three points. She has two offensive rebounds and six defensive rebounds for a total of eight.

M'Lynn Hinger made one of three baskets for her two points.

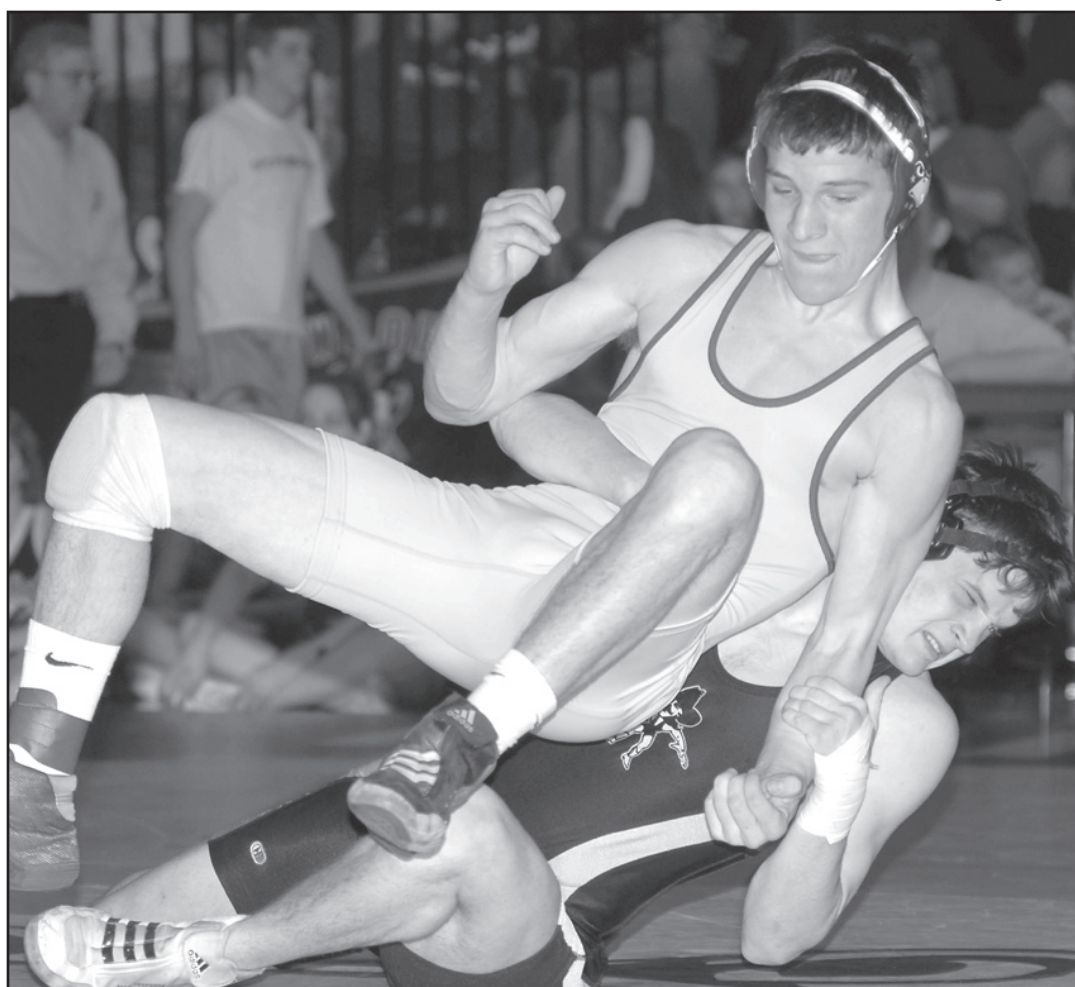

Cowboys travel to Southwestern Heights for Class 3A sub-state game on Monday

The Cowboys have been practicing this week for the first round of the Class 3A sub-state to be 5:30 p.m. on Monday at Southwestern Heights in Kismet.

The Cowboys are part of the Lakin sub-state that includes: Cimarron, Hays-Thomas More Prep-Marian, Holcomb, Kismet-Southwestern Heights, Lakin, Larned and Medicine Lodge.

Coach Smith said the Goodland opponent is the sub-state No. 1 seed, Southwestern Heights. He said it will be a tough game for the Cowboys, but feels they will be as ready as possible.

Southwestern Heights is playing Cimarron tonight and defeated Wichita County 49-38 on Tuesday bringing their record to 16-3.

The Cowboys are coming off a 52-51 loss to the Hoxie Indians, and have a 4-16 record.

Brock Wilkens leads the Cowboy scoring with an average of 10 points per game and making 50 percent of his shots. Ryan Hillmer averages 9.2 points and makes 32 percent of his shots. Robert Cowan averages 9 per game and makes 46 percent of his shots.

As a team the Cowboys hit an average of 40 percent of the field shots,

26 percent of their 3-point shots and 50 percent of the free throws.

Wilkens leads the team in rebounds with 125 and has 6 blocked shots. Cowan has 105 rebounds and 3 blocked shots. Hillmer and Kevin Amthor each have 53 rebounds, Landon Brenner 49, and Reed Belamy 44.

Amthor leads the team in assists with 27, Hillmer 20, Wilkens 17, and Brenner 12.

Coach Smith said there is no easy way to get to Kismet where the high school is located.

Three Cowboys are in Hays today for the opening rounds of the Class 3-2-1A State tournament and hoping to bring back medals.

Cowboys Seth Miller finished fourth at 125 pounds, Nathan Deeds at 140 pounds and Jay Cotter at 285 pounds finished third at the regional tournament in Norton last weekend to qualify for the state tournament.

Miller (27-15) will face Riley Soward (31-3) of Halstead in the first round at 125 pounds. Soward is the second ranked wrestler at 125.

Deeds (26-5) will face Cody Wildin (20-16) of Marion at 140 pounds. Deeds is the fifth ranked wrestler at 140.

Cotter (24-5) will face Seth Suelter (9-6) of Lincoln at 285 pounds. Cotter is the fourth ranked wrestler at 285.

The first round of the 3-2-1A tournament begins at 10 a.m. today at Gross Memorial Coliseum at Fort Hays State University. The championship quarterfinals are expected to begin at 1:30 p.m.

First round consolation will begin at 3:30 p.m.

Saturday the first round begins at 9 a.m. with consolation cross bracketing. At 10:45 a.m. are the consolation quarterfinals. At 12:15 p.m. are the consolation semifinals.

Fifth place matches will be at 1:45 p.m. followed by the consolation finals at 2:30 p.m.

The parade of champions will be 40 minutes after the consolation finals. The championship finals will follow the parade of champions.

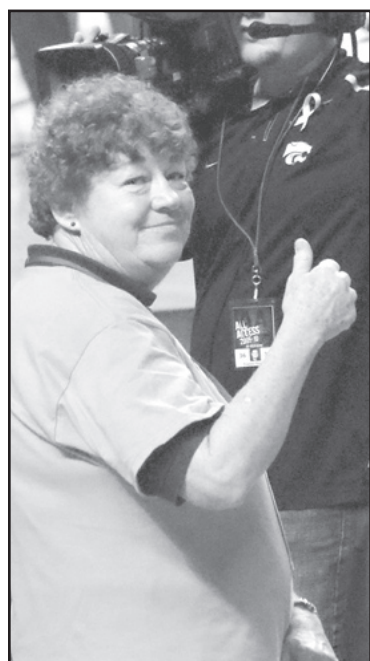
Grant teacher honored as Lady Cats alumna
