

Young hunters given special field experience

Saturday was a little cold but the sun was out and 30 kids age 10-15 got to go to a youth hunt sponsored by High Plains Rooster Chapter of Pheasants Forever. Kegan Northdurft and Ethan Black. Each won a shot gun of their very own.
The young hunters were accompanied by adults and guides who helped with planting the pheasants and chuckars for the dogs to find. All told there were about 100 people at the location on Melba Curry's land north and west of County Road 68 and west of County Road 17. This was the third year the hunt had been at this location.
The kids heard about hunter safety, got to shoot at clay pigeons at Troy Mannis' shooting stand and got to shoot at pheasants and chuckars. First time shooters shot birds from a bird launcher. The rest got to hunt behind trained dogs.
Each group of young hunters

were taken into the field after about seven birds had been planted and the dog worked across and back and forth until they came to a point where a bird was hiding. The adults would position the hunter to get a shot when the bird flew. A few times the guide had to actually kick the bird out to get it into the air. Each kid got to go out at least twice.
Everyone ate burgers for lunch prepared and served by the chapter for Pheasants Forever.
The 300 birds were from Spring Creek Game Birds and TNT Game Birds of St. Francis and R&R Game Birds of Lamar, Colo.
Numerous people brought their hunting dogs including Michael Dorn, Josh McQuitty, J. L. Wilson and MJ's Upland Dog Haven, Melvin and Julie Crow, of Goodland. Dogs also came from Kiowa, Hays and Ellis County.
The hunt has become an annual event and sponsors are planning to have another hunt next year.
