Leaf lettuce comes in variety of forms and colors

I am easily impressed by many of the forms of plant life I see growing in the vegetable garden each spring and summer, especially after a long dark winter.

Inevitable, one of the first impressions my garden provides each year is the innumerable variations of form and color in the short row of leaf lettuce that is among the first seeds planted each year.

There are the slightly variegated leaves of the Green Ice variety, the large erect leaves and deep redbronze leaves of the All-America winning Red Sails variety and the



ultra-frilly variety of Lollo Rosso of the different lettuces similar, but with its endive texture and easy the textures, the different colors and harvesting characteristics.

> A very basic vinegar and oil dressing is most agreeable with the fresh lettuce leaves. The recipe is simply three tablespoons of a good oil, olive or vegetable, 1 tablespoon of vinegar and 1/4 teaspoon of dry mustard, with salt and pepper to taste. Add a couple of your favorite flavors if you wish, such as a crushed

any light dressing you might create. Experiment if you wish, with lemon juice or any number of herbs that will add unusual taste to a freshly picked salad.

Growing leaf lettuce is a snap. Plant very early, like this weekend. Try to scatter the very small seed very evenly when you plant in a shallow row that has been watered. Cover the seed in a very shallow manner and never let it get dry. You should be enjoying an unbelievable salad in just 30 days!
