No contest plea entered on cock fighting charge

nt.betz@nwkansas.com A Sherman County man plead no contest to a charge of unlawful possession of cock fighting paraphernalia and raising fighting cocks in district court Wednesday and is now awaiting sentencing.

The charge came from a search of the home of Jesus Soto, 39, and his wife Alma about 16 miles southeast of Goodland where a combination of sheriff deputies, wildlife officers and animal health officers gathered on Nov. 23.

A trailer house was surrounded by more than 100 chickens spread out with about 70 of the roosters tied by short ropes to individual barrels in the front yard.

Wednesday Soto plead no contest to one count of unlawful possession of cock fighting paraphernalia and raising fighting cocks in front of District Judge Scott Showalter.

The plea was part of an agreement between Todd Stramel of Colby, as attorney for Soto and Sherman County Attorney Bonnie Selby.

Selby told Judge Showalter the agreement was to have Soto plead to the one count, a class 10 felony, and



and hens for 4-H projects. Showalter said as part of that Soto would have to show the birds at a fair.

He asked about the future of the other birds and Stramel said Soto was working on a plan to sell the birds to a breeding operation, but if that did not work out the remaining birds would be butchered. Stramel said it would take a few months to accomplish this.

After Soto entered his plea of no contest, Judge Showalter asked Attorney Selby what evidence she had to present in this case.

Selby said she had physical evidence of the fighting cocks, training devices, steroids and other paraphernalia plus several witnesses who could testify to all the evidence collected.

Judge Showalter said based on the plea of no contest and the discussion of evidence from the county attorney he found Soto guilty of possession of fighting cocks. He said the class 10 felony could result in imprisonment for 12 to 13 months. He said a pre-sentencing investigation would be done by Sharon Gray of Court Services.

Attorney Stramel asked to set sentencing for June, but Judge Showalter said he would rather put it on the calendar for 9 a.m. on May 11. He said if there is a need it could be moved to June, but would ask Soto to move ahead on getting rid of the birds.

Selby said it was agreed Soto could keep three roosters and some hens and chicks for their children's 4-H projects.

Judge Showalter asked Soto if he understood what he was agreeing to in the plea.

Soto said he understood.
