as late as mid-May? But there are some things I will absolutely plant this weekend, weather and soil permitting. Actually, my radishes, lettuce and most of my onion have already been planted, so the spinach and peas will

behind already as far as the peas and spinach are concerned. They really should have been planted last week because the season is so short for them. Just as soon as the 85 degree temperatures arrive on a regular basis in mid-June, you can kiss the peas and spinach goodbye. Neither of them will tolerate the heat, so it behooves us to plant both as early as possible. And since it takes about 70 days from planting to maturity for peas (only 40 to 45 days for spinach) they must be planted early in order to enjoy a producing crop.
