Bonds best option to pay for chip sealing old U.S. 24

guess when the interest rates are going to go back up, but it could be later this year.

He said another option was to pledge income from the original one percent sales tax the county shares with the city, but said he does not expect the county can do that, and the other quarter- percent is for health care.

Thomas said he did not see the county being able to do that with the sales tax.

County Clerk Janet Rumpel said she felt the county would have to increase property taxes to cover interest and principle for the current project. She said that would be about \$600,000.

Strnad suggested stretching out the payment as much as possible, but that the county would have to have about \$1 million to do the chip seal again in five years and again five years after that.

Thomas said if they can figure out a way to extend the sales tax, and might not need the whole one percent. He agreed it would be good to stretch it out and use general obligation bonds for the current project.

Cowan said the county could do a ballot issue for the future, and could decide not to go for the full one percent.

Commissioner Max Linin asked what do they do now, and what interest rate the county could pay.

Cowan said if it paid off in 20 years the interest rate would be in the mid-4 percent range.

He said the annual payment would be about \$70,000.

Linin said that is about one mill of property tax. Rumpel said she was looking at possibly three mills to allow for \$50,000 for reserve, and pay the interest this year.

Cowan said the bonds could be issued in the next few months so the county would have the money available when the project was done this summer.

He said he could have a resolution ready for the next meeting for the bonds.

Rumpel said the cost of the project has gone up as the cost of the oil is \$30,000 higher than expected. She said Curt Way, public works manager, gave her the new cost. It is \$591,000 plus the \$30,000 for the oil.

She asked if the cost for the bonds would be included in the total.

Cowan said it would be included and the total would be about \$630,000.

He said a decision the commissioners will have to make is about how the bonds are sold and if they have someone to underwrite the issue.

Rumpel said a man would be at the next meeting to talk to the commissioners about that part of the project

One thing the commissioners will be looking at is if the local banks might be interested in purchasing part or all of the bonds.

Strnad said it seemed the local banks are interested.

Cowan said he thought some of that is the banks want the short-term parts of the issue.
