

Flight winners for 21st Slice of Life tournament

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The 21st Annual Slice of Life golf tournament was held Saturday at Sugar Hills Golf Club to raise money for the Northwest Kansas Area Medical Foundation and the winning teams had great weather and great scores.

The Beach Party on the Plains on Friday raised \$61,042 in the auction which is ahead of the \$49,490 from last year said Tina Goodwin, marketing director for Goodland Regional Medical Center.

Dale Schields of the medical foundation said the corporate sponsorships brought in about \$37,000 and the golf tournament added another \$18,000 to bring the total to \$116,042 ahead of what was raised last year.

Schields said the foundation people were pleased with the results, and the money will allow the foundation to support the major projects at the hospital including the dialysis clinic and membership in the Midwest Cancer Alliance through the University of Kansas Cancer Center.

Schields said the golf tournament had a full 45 teams and were split into flights Acute (men's), Chronic (men's), Maligner (mixed) and Malady (ladies).

The team of Ron Evans, Kevan Taylor and Barry Lucas were the top winners in the Acute flight with a score of 54. Second went to the team of Randy Toppliff, Chase Toppliff and Leo Hayden with a 58. Third place was a tie at 59 between the team of Dr. Troy Hallagin, Tyler Hallagin and Mikey Doll and the team of Rollie Hallagin, Dr. Travis Daise and Jason Johnson. The tie breaker gave the win to Dr. Troy Hallagin's team based on scorecards for both teams as determined by the tournament committee.

Dr. Troy Hallagin's team had won the tournament the year before with a 57, and the Rollie Hallagin team was second last year with a 58.

First place in the Chronic flight was a tie at 66 between the team of Brent Linin, Rich Devlin and Brian Linin and the team of Trevor Linton, Darren Kannady and Mark Gillming. The tie breaker went to the Brian Linin team based on
