

Slammers finish third at McCook tournament

The Goodland Slammers 14 and under fastpitch team got a blemish on their season record at the McCook state prep tournament finishing third the last weekend of June.

The Slammers won the first game against the McCook Rebels 5-2, but lost to Kearney Edge 18-1, and came back to defeat the Kearney Krush 7-2.

In the single elimination tournament the Slammers won the first game defeating Hastings Crush 13-0. In the semi-finals Goodland had to face the Kearney Edge and again lost in a closer game 3-1.

The loss put the Slammers in the third place game against the Kearney Krush and Goodland was able to come away with an 8-4 win to take third place.

"This was a tough tournament," said Coach Andy Scheopner. "I thought we played really well. Kearney beat McCook in the championship game."

The Slammers started the tournament against the McCook Rebels

and took an early 2-0 lead in the first inning. Stephanie DeLaRosa walked, Berkley White hit a sacrifice to move DeLaRosa to third. Gabby Rangel walked. DeLaRosa scored on a passed ball and Megan Siruta hit a single to sore Angel.

McCook tied the score 2-2 in the second inning. Goodland came back in the third to take a 4-2 lead. DeLaRosa walked. White singled and both scored on a single by Siruta.

Goodland added an insurance run in the fifth when Carlee Cooper was safe on a fielders choice and then scored on a triple by DeLaRosa.

DeLaRosa was the winning pitcher. She pitched six innings, gave up 2 hits, 2 runs, 17 strikeouts and 1 walk.

"Stephanie dominated on the mound," Scheopner said. "She had 17 strikeouts out of the 18 outs. This was a good game and a good way to start the tournament."

The second game was not so good for the Slammers as they fell behind the Kearney Edge 3-1 in the first in-

ning and were unable to score losing 18-1 in three innings.

The lone Slammer run was a home run by Hope Cochran. Cochran was the starting pitcher going two innings and giving up 9 hits, 14 runs, had 3 strikeouts and gave up 8 walks.

DeLaRosa came in for the third inning and gave up 4 hits, 4 runs, had 3 strikeouts and gave up no walks.

"This was one of those games that whatever could go wrong went wrong," Scheopner said. "It was a hot afternoon and we really struggled. After this game I was hoping we could bounce back and play a good third game."

In the third game against the Kearney Krush the Slammers took a 2-0 lead in the second inning and added 3 in the third and 2 in the fourth for a 7-2 win. In the game White had a home run in the third inning scoring Cochran and DeLaRosa. Siruta had a double and a single. Lindsay Bauman had two singles, Amber Smith had a single, Miranda Hernandez

had a double, Kate-Lynn King and Cooper each had singles.

DeLaRosa was the winning pitcher going four innings giving up 4 hits, 2 runs, had 8 strikeouts and no walks.

"It was great to see us bounce back and play well after our first loss," Scheopner said.

On Sunday the Slammers were in a single elimination tourney. Scheopner said four of the six teams had tied with 2-1 records. The tournament officials went to a tie breaker, which was the runs scored against you, Scheopner said. With that one bad game the Slammers ended up fourth seed even though they had beaten the second and third seed.

The Slammers made quick work of the Hastings Crush taking an early 5-0 lead and adding 8 in the second to win 13-0 in three innings.

Cochran had two home runs in the game, and pitched the third inning giving up no hits, no runs, had 1 strikeout and gave up 2 walks.

DeLaRosa was the starting pitch-

er and went two innings giving up 1 hits, no runs, had 3 strikeouts and gave up 2 walks.

Bauman had a single, White had a double, Rangel had a single, Siruta had a double and a single, Smith had two singles and Jordan Knitig had a single.

"The win put us in the semi-finals against the Kearney Edge," Scheopner said.

The Kearney Edge were the team that had handed the Slammers their first loss on Saturday, and Goodland fell behind 2-0 on a bunt and an error.

The Edge scored again in the second to make it 3-0. Goodland scored in the third on a single by Bauman and a triple by Cochran to make it 3-1.

Neither team scored in the final three innings to give the Edge the 3-1 win.

"This was a very tight game all the way," Scheopner said.

DeLaRosa was the losing pitcher going 6 innings, giving up 8 hits,

3 runs, had 9 strikeouts and no walks.

In the third place game the Slammers faced the Kearney Krush with each team scoring 3 runs in the first, but Goodland out scored the Krush in the second to take a 5-4 lead.

The Slammers added 3 runs in the third to win 8-4.

Cochran got hit by a pitch in the first inning, stole second and scored on a single by Bauman. DeLaRosa singled, White grounded out and Bauman scored. DeLaRosa scored on a passed ball.

In the second inning Hernandez singled, Cooper hit into a fielders choice. Cochran tripled and Cooperscored and Cochran was thrown out at the plate. Bauman singled. DeLaRosa walked and White single to score Bauman.

In the third inning Siruta doubled, Cooper singled and Cochran hit a triple to score both Siruta and Cooper. Cochran scored on a passed ball.

DeLaRosa was the winning pitcher going 4 innings giving up 6 hits, 4 runs, 5 strikeouts and 2 walks.

Goodland swim team takes second at Oakley, set two pool records

The Goodland Swim Team competed at Oakley on Saturday, June 25, and placed second behind Colby with 218 points. They set two pool records, won 12 individual races and won seven relays.

The next action for the team will be the two-day Northwest Kansas Swim League Championship at Colby on Friday and Saturday, July 9 and 10. They have the weekend off for the 4th of July.

Ian Bonsall (13-14 boys) and Taryn Bedore (13-14 girls) won all three of their individual races. Bonsall broke the record in the 50-yard freestyle (25.69) and won the 400-yard freestyle (5:23.96) and 100-yard freestyle (1:10.43). Bedore won the 100-yard freestyle (1:04.77) and 50-yard freestyle (28.08) and the 100-yard butterfly (1:10.43).

Levi House (9-10 boys) won two gold medals in the 100-yard freestyle (1:27.69) and 25-yard backstroke (20.31).

Those winning one event were Devinee Borgman (9-10 girls) 25-yard butterfly (18.05), Hagan Hoss (11-12 boys) 50-yard backstroke (44.30), Gerrell Miller (13-14 boys) 100-yard backstroke (1:20.79) and Zach Miller (13-14 boys) 100-yard

breaststroke (1:23.34).

Holton Witman (13-14 boys) beat the 50-yard freestyle record (25.94) but finished in second behind Bonsall.

The 13-14 boys 200-yard medley relay set a record (2:27.23) with Bonsall, Zach Miller, Holton Witman and Ace Arteaga swimming. They also won the 200-yard freestyle relay (2:14.16) with Bonsall, Coy Johnson, Zach Miller and Holton Witman swimming.

Other relay winners were 9-10 girls 100-yard medley relay (1:33.27) with Chalee Luther, Mikayla Stoffel, Borgmann and Hannah Eslinger swimming; 9-10 mixed 100-yard freestyle (1:23.49) with Levi House Teryn Teeter, Chase Johnson and Ryan Volk swimming; 11-12 mixed 200-yard freestyle (2:23.98) with Dusty Johnson, Paetyn Barriclow, Drew House and Hoss swimming; 11-12 mixed 200-yard medley (3:01.74) with Barriclow, Dusty Johnson, Drew House and Hoss swimming; 13-14 girls 200-yard medley (2:45.94) with Rachel Horney, Makayla Kennedy, Bedore and Makala Fogg swimming.

In 8 and under girls Rachel Witman was third in the 50-yard free-

style (45.67), second in the 25-yard freestyle (20.07) and third in the 25-yard backstroke (23.14).

In 8 and under mixed the 100-yard freestyle was fifth (2:22.27) with Rebecca Lockhart, Olivia Bassett, Rachel Witman and Gantzen Miller swimming.

In 9-10 girls Borgmann was second in the 25-yard freestyle (15.84) and third in the 100-yard individual medley (1:33.64); Mikayla Stoffel was fourth in the 100-yard freestyle (1:35.49) and fifth in the 25-yard breaststroke (23.65); and Luther was third in the 25-yard freestyle (17.72), sixth in the 25-yard backstroke (23.40) and fourth in the 25-yard breaststroke (23.31).

In 9-10 girls the 100-yard freestyle was second (1:17.58) with Mikayla Stoffel, Eslinger, Borgmann and Luther swimming.

In 9-10 boys Levi House was fourth in the 25-yard freestyle (17.94) and Chase Johnson third in the 100-yard freestyle (1:33.46) and fourth in the 25-yard butterfly (26.24).

In 9-10 mixed the 100-yard medley was second (1:55.53) with Levi House, Ryan Volk, Chase Johnson and Montana Noffsinger swimming.

In 11-12 boys Dusty Johnson was second in the 100-yard freestyle (1:16.91), third in the 50-yard butterfly (41.77) and third in the 100-yard individual medley (1:29.94); Hoss second in the 50-yard freestyle (33:53) and fourth in the 50-yard butterfly (43.54); Drew House third in the 100-yard freestyle (1:22.87), fourth in the 50-yard freestyle (36.49) and second 50-yard butterfly (41.58).

In 13-14 girls Fogg was fourth in the 400-yard freestyle (7:11.02) and fourth in the 100-yard butterfly (1:51.92) and Kennedy was fifth in 400-yard freestyle (8:01.12).

In 13-14 girls the 200-yard freestyle was second (2:36.69) with Bedore, Kennedy, Horney and Fogg swimming.

In 13-14 boys Holton Witman was third in the 400-yard freestyle (5:44.78) and second in the 100-yard backstroke (1:21.42); Zach Miller is fourth in 400-yard freestyle (5:50.70) and second in 200-yard individual medley (2:53.86); Gerrell Miller second in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:23.95) and third 200-yard individual medley (2:59.27); Aaron Avelar third in the 100-yard backstroke (1:44.81); Coy Johnson fourth in 100-yard breast-

stroke (1:43.55); and Arteaga fifth in the 400-yard freestyle (6:39.47).

In 13-14 mixed the 200-yard freestyle was fourth (2:21.12) with Gerrell Miller, Kinsey Volk, Avelar and Arteaga swimming.

In 13-14 mixed the 200-yard medley was third (2:52.40) with Gerrell Miller, Coy Johnson, Avelar and Kinsey Volk swimming.

In 15-18 girls Brooke Lockhart was fifth in the 400-yard freestyle (6:18.93) and fifth in 100-yard backstroke (1:37.24).

In 15-18 boys Timothy Fugleberg

was sixth in the 100-yard freestyle (1:33.84), sixth in 50-yard freestyle (40.86) and fifth in 100-yard backstroke (2:10.75).

Shayley Miller also competed.

Team scores were Colby first with 271 points, Oberlin Swim Club third with 190 points, Burlington Swim Team fourth 181.5, Wray Swim Team Fifth 174.5, Holyoke Swim Club sixth with 147, Oakley Swim Team seventh 69 and Flagler eighth with 57 points.

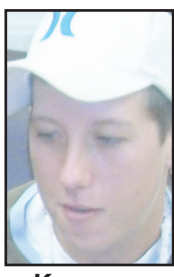

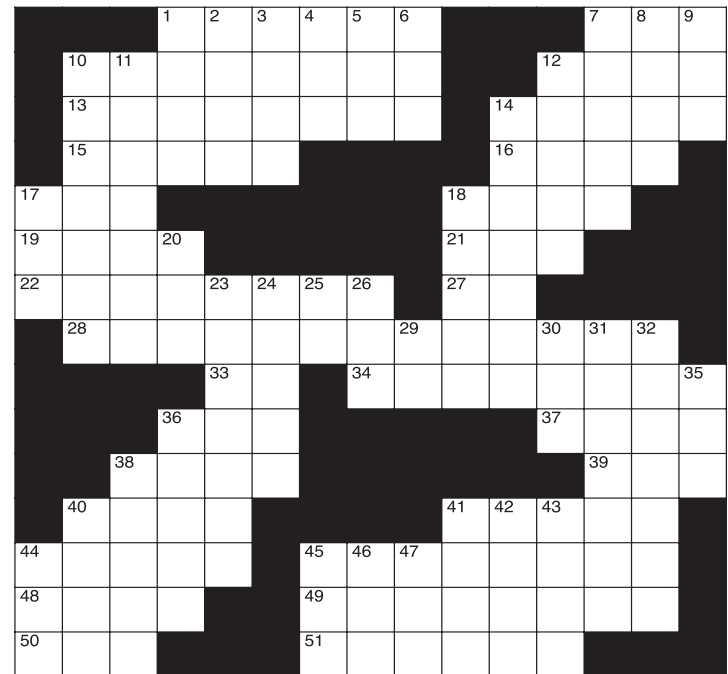
