Morrison, a Colby native, has served in the Kansas House of Representatives for 18 years. He took over for the last few months of a term and then ran in the 1992 election. He said the extra few months allowed him to get a lot more one-on-one training as a lawmaker, rather

than in a class with other freshmen legislators.

Morrsion said while he doesn't come back to the district more than a few times during each session, he spends a lot of time on the phone with his constituents.

'People here have brilliant ideas," he said, "and they work in most instances - with a little baling wire."

Morrison said he gets quite a few angry calls, but many are angry at the state rather than at him.

"Most people dislike politics," he said. "I don't blame them."
