The Goodland Slammers 14 and under fastpitch baseball team added another tournament win with a first place finish at the Super "C" in Dodge City over the weekend.

The Slammers won five of six games with two games on Saturday and four games on Sunday. Coach Andy Scheopner said the four games on Sunday was tough on the girls, but they did well and had to come back in the championship game against the Great Bend Quicksilver to win 10-7.

The Slammers are in Emporia today for the opening round of the state tournament. Scheopner said the first game for the girls will be at 4 p.m. The tournament will continue on Saturday and Sunday.

At Dodge City 10 teams competed coming from Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas Scheopner said.


On Saturday the Slammers defeated the Osawatomie Rockets 10-0 in four innings and defeated the Liberal Laces 7-3 in six innings.




