Goodland natives start final college seasons

Former Goodland Cowboy Mark Starr, a senior offensive lineman at Colorado State University, begins his last season as a Ramon Saturday, Sept. 4, against the Colorado Buffaloes at Mile High Stadium in Denver.

Dani Bedore, a 2007 graduate of Brewster High School, is a senior volleyball player for the University of Wyoming. The Cowgirls open their season on Friday, Aug. 27, during a tournament at home in Laramie against Southern Utah University.

Both Colorado State and Wyoming are members of the Mountain West Conference.

Starr, a 2006 Goodland High graduate, redshirted his first year at Colorado State then played in all 25 games during the 2007 and 2008 seasons starting in seven games the first year and four the next. In 2009 he played in 10 games for the Rams with five starts while missing two games in mid-October due to injury.

Starr, who wears No. 78, is listed first on the Rams' depth chart at strongside tackle. He is the son of Neal and Brenda Starr of Goodland. Bedore, who attended Goodland

High her freshman and sophomore years, played her first season of college volleyball at the University of South Carolina. She played in 29 matches for the Gamecocks.

In her two seasons at Wyoming, Bedore has started in all 56 matches for the Cowgirls. Last season she was second on the team in service aces with 29 and fourth in kills with 226.

Wearing No. 1, Bedore is one of six returning starters for the Cowgirls who went 13-18 overall last season. She is the daughter of Dustin and Barb Bedore of Goodland.
