Relay raises more than \$33,000

The community effort raised \$33,506 as of Friday night, said Ginger Chadwick, with more expected to come in over the next few days. The top three teams raising money were Paw Wash, Right Combination Dance Studio and Teachers for Life. The goal for this year was \$33,000.

When the teams, survivors and others arrived before 7 p.m. The band Nobody Important was playing while luminaries and camp sites were being set up. The Kiwanis served more than 250 hamburgers and hot dogs.

Committee member Jay Sanderson of KLOE, KKCI and KWGB was the master of ceremonies. The presentation of the American flag was done by the Goodland Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Cancer survivors Whitney Schultz of Brewster and Denny Sorwell of Goodland, talked about their battle with cancer. Schultz, a senior at Brewster High School, said her disease brought a lot of firsts in her life. She had a brain tumor. First emergency room visit, first x-rays, first MRI and the list goes on. She said at her first chemotherapy session each patient was given a bag of things to do including a Plays Station Portable with a game, books and crafts. She started a necklace to mark each event with beads representing chemotherapy, each stick with a needle and the list goes on. Shultz said her goal is to become a nurse at the children's hospital where she received so much care.

Sorwell talked about her journey with breast cancer. A very important part of her recovery was staying positive and she said she tried to surround herself with positive people.

A feature was the Locks of Love where people had 10 inches of hair cut off to help make wigs for those going through cancer treatment. More than five had their hair cut by Carol Lennington of Shear Dimen-



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City commissioners agreed to give homeowners of three foundations and a lot with two trailers 90 days to clean up the property and one was asked to find a way to get rid of two old mobile trailers.

The foundations involved are at 526 W. 16, 419 Harrison Ave., and 1310 College Ave. The two trailers are located at 714 and 718 Eustis

Commissioners held hearings on the four and asked the owners who attended what their plans were.

City Fire Chief and Building Inspector Brian James said the owner of the foundation at 526 W. 16th,

City plans to begin fog sealing on Thursday

About one-third of the city streets have been chip sealed, and beginning Thursday the second phase of fog sealing will begin Erickson said. said Phil Erickson, city street superintendent.

Erickson said the chip sealing is done in two phases.

"We have done the regular chip sealing," he said, "and now we are ready to do a fog seal on top.

"After the fog seal the street has to be closed for three hours before it can be driven on to give the fog coat time to dry."

The program will take a few days, Erickson said, but the schedule could be affected by the weather. He said the city crew would be knocking on doors along the program streets to get all the vehicles off the street for Sherman Ave. west to Cattlefog sealing.

If there is a problem the city can have vehicles towed away for the program to be successful

The streets to be chip sealed include Toelkes from Main Ave. east to Caldwell Ave.; Center Ave. from Maple to Eighth; 15th from Arcade Ave. east to Eustis; First from Grand Ave. west to Kansas Ave. Fourth from Sherman Ave. east to Caldwell; Broadway Ave. from 17th north to Toelkes; Eustis Ave. from Fourth to Second and from 15th to 13th; Wyoming Ave. from Eighth south to 17th; Texas Ave. from 17th north to 10th; Syracuse Ave. from Eighth south to 17th; Fourth from Kansas to Grand Ave.; College from Fourth north to Eighth; and 17th from
