City water rates to increase by \$8 a month

nt.betz@nwkansas.com Construction continues on the water treatment plant and more main water lines are to be installed in the next month, but the city commissioners spent time on Tuesday looking at the water rates and approved an increase of \$8 a month to be implemented in October.

"We have been here before," City Manager Doug Gerber said. "I am bringing this up because the commission has not made a formal decision on raising the water rates. As we talked during the budget the assumption was to include an increase of \$5 a month to go into effect this fall."

The \$5 increase would increase the monthly base from \$7.60 to \$12.60, and leave the consumption at \$1.07 per 100 cubic feet used over the first 300 cubic feet rate. each month.

The \$5 increase would bring in an additional \$133,560 each year.

An increase of \$10 per month would bring in \$267,120 each year. Another option was to increase the base to \$15 and increase the usage to \$1.50 per 100 cubic feet.

Gerber said while the commission was reviewing the rates he wanted to look at where the \$5 would put the city in reference to the water improvement project.

"I believe we have the capacity to borrow from ourselves to pay the water project," he said. "The total cost is about \$5 million and we will get 32 percent forgiven with the federal stimulus money (\$1.6 million). With the maximum engineering cost of \$750,000 the total debt would be \$4,150,000. Over 20 years it would take about \$300,000 to pay that back with interest. It is about \$210,000 without interest."

Gerber said paying the state over the 20 years at 3.63 percent interest would cost the city \$1,997,984 in interest.

"There are a large number of options between these numbers," he said. "I want ered," Billinger said. "I want to be comfortto make sure everyone understands where we are and what that would mean."

Gerber said they had talked about paying the whole loan off and then paying the city back.A\$5 a month raise is not an aggressive schedule, he said.

Billinger said the \$5 brings in an additional \$133,000 and said with the increase the water department would be bringing in \$864,000 a year.

"There is not any room to pay anything out of the water fund," Gerber said.

'We have some of the small stuff covable with the figures. This is not a fun deal. It is hard especially when times are tough.

"I think loaning ourselves the money is million in interest.

"What about paying off the existing water loan. That might eliminate the \$184,000 payment. We might be able to use that to help cash flow the repayment to ourselves."

"It is good sound economics," Billinger said.

Dechant asked if the city could pay the water loan off.

"Yes." Gerber said, "The state said it is good we are thinking about paying off the new loan so they can reuse the money quicker.'

Billinger said the other side is yes, we are running our reserves down, but that is what we have reserves for.

"It is good for the citizens that we are in a position to do this," he said. "The question is how much are you comfortable with and what can you handle."

Daniels said he figured at 20 years with no interest about \$7 a month would cover it.

Commissioner John Garcia said he figures it and \$8 would make it work.

Gerber suggested the commission might step the fee with a \$5 increase this fall and another \$3 next spring.
