

Cowboys look to bounce back against Holcomb

The Cowboys look to bounce back in Holcomb against the Longhorns at 6:30 p.m. tonight.

Goodland fell to Ulysses last week in a disappointing home opener 25-8 making their record (1-1). They look to bounce back against a winless Holcomb team (0-2).

The Longhorns show motion 90 percent of the time when they are on offense.

Longhorn Quarterback Logan Singhisen (4) is the biggest playmaker.

The leading rusher for the Longhorns is fullback Jose Munoz (3), and is known to run a lot to the outside, which was hard for Goodland to stop against Ulysses.

Singhisen is the leading passer for Holcomb completing 7 of 25 passes for 87-yards and 3 interceptions.

Leading receiver for Holcomb, Kyle Walck (22) has 3 receptions for 56 yards.

The Cowboys have a new focus about them this week.

Coming off of an unexpected loss has refocused the Cowboys who hope to get a shot at redemption with a win tonight.

Goodland will try to improve on offensive line play, including the running backs devolving better blocks when assigned, the coaches have said.



Skill positions will work on taking care of the ball Coach Teeter has said.

The receivers will work hard this week at fighting off being jammed at the line of scrimmage, he said, quarterbacks are being told to stay in the pocket, get pre-snap reads on the defense, and throw quicker and with more confidence in themselves.

Defensively the defensive ends will lower their stance to a three-point, the coaches said. Linebackers will practice a more aggressive style, but keeping their shoulders square to the play and read the keys of the offense.

Cowgirls finish ninth at Buffalo Dunes

The Cowgirls golf team was at Buffalo Dunes in Garden City on Monday for a tournament with Goodland finishing ninth out of 12 teams.

Coach Connie Livengood said the team score was not as good as she had hoped.

"We need to narrow down the numbers on a couple of schools we see at our regionals," she said. "Mainly Syracuse, Lakin and Holcomb."

She said the teams are tough at the Garden City tournament with mostly 5A and 6A schools.

"The girls have to play the course and challenge themselves to do things better," she said. "Putting really was a problem for us, but the greens at the bigger courses are going to be faster. We have been practicing and playing on greens that have been plugged, they are simply very slow."

"The girls will learn with experience to find a pace on the green to put the putts in or at least close to the hole."

Livengood said she was not disappointed in the girls because Buffalo Dunes is a tough course with sand, water and lots of slope to the fairways. The course has tall rough cuts of grass that are very hard to hit out of.

Cortney Cowan had her first par today and that is exciting, Livengood said.

Jazzmin Weis had a great day driving the ball, but the second shots caught up with her. Putting was good for Jazz, Livengood said.

The rest of team, only shot a few strokes higher than in Goodland, so I still think we are making progress, she said.

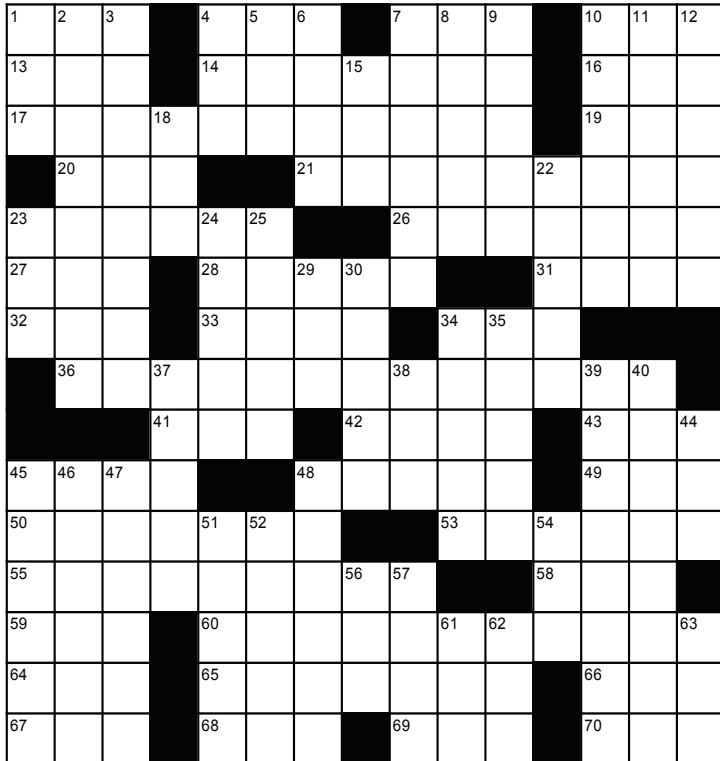
"We are learning to play in height competitive situations. I am pleased in how we are maturing as a team."
