Woody Allen once said, "Only God can make a tree, probably because it's so hard to get the bark on."




Late September through October is an excellent time to plant springflowering bulbs such as crocus, tulips and daffodils. These plants need to develop roots in the fall and must meet a chilling requirement over the winter in order to bloom in the spring.

Choose a planting site that has full sun to partial shade. The ideal soil would be a sandy loam. Even poor soils can be used if organic material such as peat moss, compost, or aged bark is mixed in. For example, a



heavy clay can be amended by mixfive tablespoons of a complete ing in one-third to one-half organic fertilizer such as a 10-10-10 during material. Soil pH should be between 6.0 and 7.0.

Bulbs need good aeration as well as good drainage for proper development. It is best if the bulbs
