

Cowboys want home field victory over Beavers

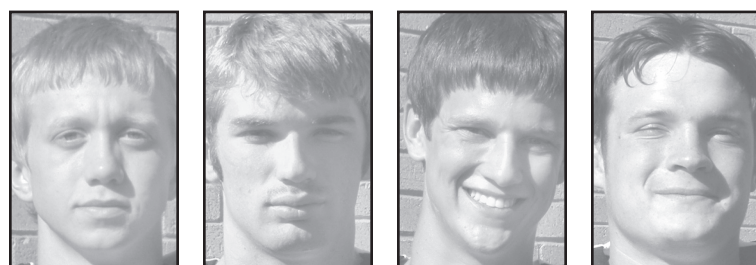

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Tonight at 6:30 p.m. the undefeated Scott City Beavers come to Cowboy Stadium to face the Cowboys who are 2-1 after blowing out Holcomb last week.

The Beavers are undefeated, beating Garden City 16-14, Holcomb 39-0, and Colby 42-14.

The Cowboys defeated Holcomb 38-13 on Friday, lost to Ulysses, 25-8 the week before and had opened with a 46-8 win at Hugoton.

Quarterback for Scott City is Ron Baker, who has completed 12 of 31 passes for 183 yards, a touchdown and has one interception.

Jason Williams leads the Beaver ground charge carrying the ball 41 times for 292 yards and three scores. Baker also carries, taking it 23 times for 97 yards and three touchdowns. O'Neil is the leading receiver with 4 receptions for 56 yards.

On defense Colborn Couchman leads the Beavers in tackles with 17.

Cowboy quarterback Reed Bellamy is the only player to throw a pass this year, completing 42 of 68 for 482 yards, 5 touchdowns and one

interception. Bellamy has rushed 31 times for 145 yards.

Riley Oharah has 27 carries for 86 yards and one score. Kelly Pearson has 24 carries for 180 yards and one score. Brock Wilkens has caught 13 balls for 134 yards and one touchdown. Dillon Trachsel has 8 receptions for 130 yards.

On defense Nathan Deeds has 21 tackles.

A traditionally good, physical, and fast team, Scott City is playing 5 sophomores but they are carrying on that tradition. Other than losing size on the offensive line, Scott City is a very good team said Cowboys Coach Kent Teeter. They like to

run the ball to the outside, mostly in a two running back, one wing back and wide receiver to one side of the field; which is their Beaver formation.

Effective running up the middle, and mostly to the outside the defensive line for the Cowboys will be a vital part of the game again this week, he said.

The Beavers run a 4-defensive lineman, 4-linebacker defense, which the Cowboys have seen at times this year.

Statistically the Beavers have scored 97 points in their three games to 28 points scored against them. The Cowboys have scored 92 points

with 46 scored against.

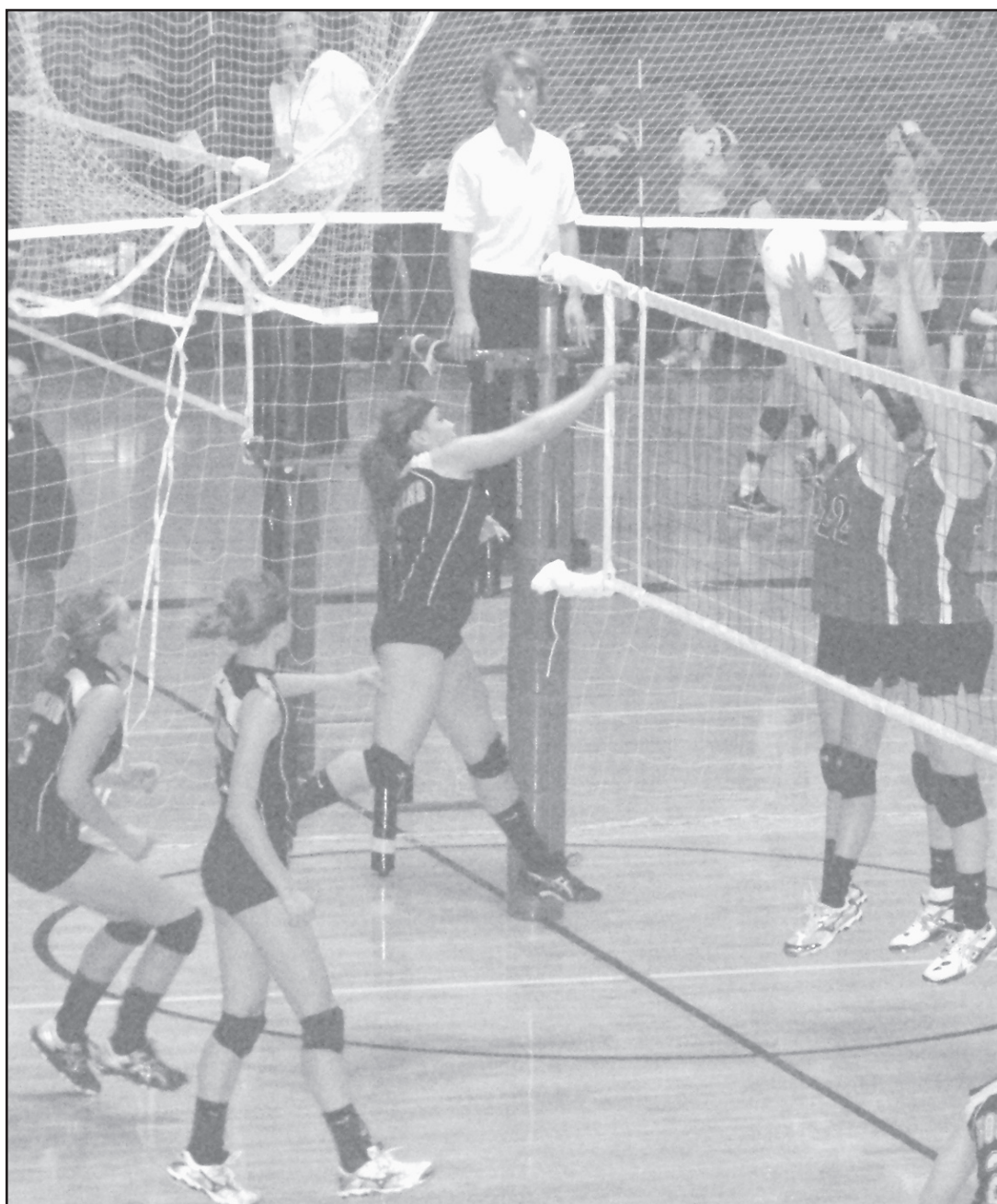
The Beavers average 298 yards rushing per game to the 231 yards for the Cowboys. In the passing game the Cowboys have averaged 161 yards to 75 for the Beavers.

In total offense the Cowboys have averaged 391 yards with the Beavers close behind at 373 yards.

The Cowboys are trying to break a home field winless streak that dates back to Oct. 24, 2008 when they defeated Ness City-Dighton Titans 43-8.

Next week the Cowboys will be in Lakin and come back for Homecoming on Oct. 8, to play the Colby Eagles in a non-conference game.

In Colby the Cowgirls shot a 306 as a team and took fourth place.

The Cowgirls in Russell had a little better performance, Livengood said.

Jazz Weis continues to lead the team in scoring, she shot a 52 for the eighth place medal, Livengood said.

Jacquelynn Gulley shot a 59 for 20th, and Jordan Knitnig tied that score but placed 21st.

Megan Siruta shot a 62, Katelyn Coon shot a 69 and Miranda Hernandez shot a 73 to round out the team scores.

The team took fifth shooting a total of 232.

"We are getting better as a team," Livengood said. "We need to get into the game mentally for a complete nine holes, but we are making strides towards that. The team is doing great and I am having a lot of fun with them."

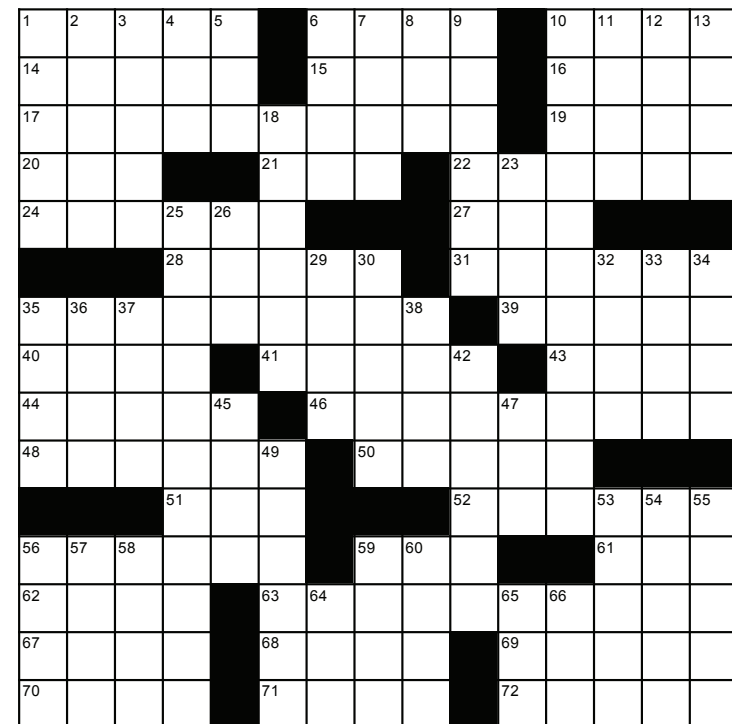

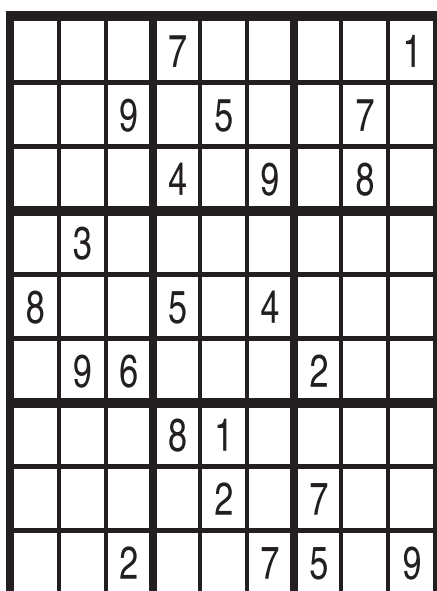
