preliminary work before the bond would cost \$75,000 to \$80,000 on a \$10 million dollar project and if the bond did not pass half would be forgiven making the cost between \$35,000 to \$40,000. Hutton's said their cost would be \$75,000 to \$80,000 on a \$10 million dollar project even if the bond did not pass.

The contract between the district and ARCHI+ETC has yet to be negotiated.

Superintendent Angelos said that the head count for the district on Monday, Sept. 20, was 869. That was an increase of seven over last year. On Aug. 23 the head count had been 892.

The representative of the board to the Northwest Tech Board Dick Short reported on what was going on at the college. He said that \$7,000 was raised in the golf benefit for the college. The enrollment is up 100 students from last year from 284 to 384.

He reported Northwest Tech had sold the former Buffalo Inn and

restaurant. The college would keep the two buildings on the west for student housing.

The first day for wrestling practice for the college was Monday.

In other business the board:

- Bought their own vision screening equipment.

- Paid \$43,269 in bills.

- Heard from Superintendent Angelos that the Flatlander chili contest had raised \$10,000 for the district and the college.

- Accepted the bid from Finley Motors for two new GMC Yukon nine passenger vehicles for \$32,570 each. Both Herl Chevrolet-Buick and Dan Brenner Ford had entered bids. Herl's bid came in second and Brenner's bid was disqualified because its vehicle would only haul eight passengers.

- Voted to continue its support for the Neighborhood Revitalization Program. The city, county and the school district have to support it as they are the ones who get money from property taxes.

- Hired Gina Hill as a paraprofessional for Grant Junior High.

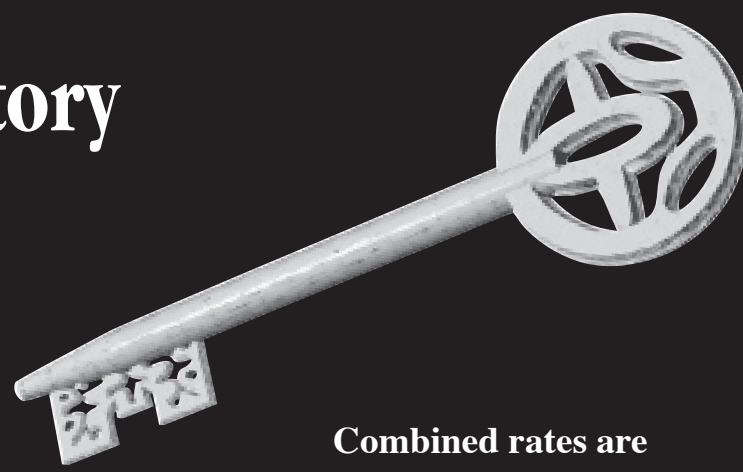
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
