Fire forces residents to disperse

karen.k@nwkansas.com About 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday afternoon, smoke was evident at the Good Samaritan Village in St. Francis. The staff called 911 and began moving residents out of the building. Within 15 minutes, all residents were safely out.

By late Tuesday afternoon all the residents had been sorted out to other nursing homes with 12 being moved to the Goodland Good Samaritan Society.

Workers had been putting insulation in the attic of the facility and it was suspected there might have been something that went wrong but there are no reports have confirmed a cause.

The fire apparently started in the attic of the facility toward the east end and spread through the attic and down the walls.

Firemen, emergency medical technicians and law officers were on the scene almost immediately. Residents had been moved to the north and west sides of the building. One of the staff remarked it was a nice day so they could be moved outside.

At one point, the wind changed direction and residents on the north side were moved to the east end. It was a community effort as people arrived to help move the residents and records and gather needed supplies.

Ambulances from around the area arrived to help move residents. The St. Francis Indian activity bus was used as a vehicle to move people who were able to walk and climb the steps.

The St. Francis high school gym was opened up and residents were moved in. Doctors and nurses arrived to help the Village staff with any medical problems, to take vitals and reassure residents that they were going to be OK.

The school staff and students showed up with water and snacks. The students were talking to residents, others were helping load and unload equipment while others were running errands as needed.

A dozen residents were moved to the Sherman County Good Samaritan Society, and one of the relatives said the Goodland bus came to pick them up and had supper waiting for them when they arrived. She said the Goodland staff cleaned up the residents, found clean clothes for those who needed them and were very kind and caring to those who had been uprooted from their "homes."
