Mobile app program approved

tion and Entertainment Development program beginning in August with approval Wednesday by the Kansas Board of Regents.

The Kansas Board of Regents approved the state of the art two-year program after a lengthy review and presentations by Northwest Tech staff.

The impetus for the program came as Northwest Tech began handing every student and faculty member Apple iPads in August, and has been the first technical college in the country to go wireless. Over the year Ben Coumerilh, director of technology, and Dr. Ed Mills, college president have been looking for way to make Northwest Tech stand out as a unique educational opportunity.

The college has had great support from Apple and other computer companies from California who have encouraged the Northwest Tech staff to find ways to expand the use of the iPads and are helping with the develop-

Northwest Tech will offer a Mobile Applica- ment of the mobile application program.

Business Week identified App Development as the fastest growing profession with average starting wages ranging from \$60,000 to \$100,000. Graduates of the program will have opportunities to work remotely for companies around the globe as well as in positions with local companies.

The advisory board for the Northwest Tech program consists of representatives from Apple, Inc., Sparrow Development, Quark Studios, New Age Wireless and H20 Church TV.

"Mobile Application and Entertainment Development will be the very first complete two year program for app development in the nation," an Apple representative said.

There will be a nine-month certificate option or a two-year associate degree option available for this program, Coumerilh said.

Apple is planning to do a documentary on Northwest Tech and the use of the iPads with

May. The college has been working with a number of people in the community to explore ways to expand and incorporate the iPad and other application programs into the business community.

Coumerilh and Diane Stiles, vice president of student affairs, approached the Sherman County Commissioners recently about a possible plan to use the Telephone building at 10th and Main Ave. as classrooms and a small business incubator to support the mobile app program. The college is applying for federal grant money to help renovate and upgrade the telephone building to include an elevator and adequate restrooms.

The county commissioners said they would be willing to donate the building if the college gets the grant money.

"In the Mobile App program, students will learn how to develop apps in the rapidly expanding iPhone and iPad market," said Jeff

> "Northwest Tech's Mobile App and Entertainment Development program will enable students to create apps and games for the iPhone, iPod Touch, and iPad and to build cross-platform, mobile web-apps to run on nearly any modern smart-phone platform including iPhone, Android, Blackberry, Windows Mobile, Symbian and more."

> Northwest Tech will take up to 60 students on campus, plus additional online students for the Mobile App and Entertainment Development program.
