County explores mowing options, bids being taken

The suggestion was to run two ads in the newspaper one for mowing the roads per swath mile (includes both sides) and a second ad for a used tractor and rotary mower for the intersections.

The ads call for bids on the mowing and tractor and rotary mower to be delivered to the Sherman County Clerk's office by 5 p.m. on Monday, Aug.8, with the decision to be made at the meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 9.

The commissioners agreed they want to see the mowing begin as soon as possible after the contract is approved. They agreed to go with mail routes, and do the main roads first.

The mowing bid calls for mowing approximately 1,200 miles of county roads excluding old U.S.24. With the need to do both sides of the road that makes it approximately 2.400 miles based on a per swath mile price.
