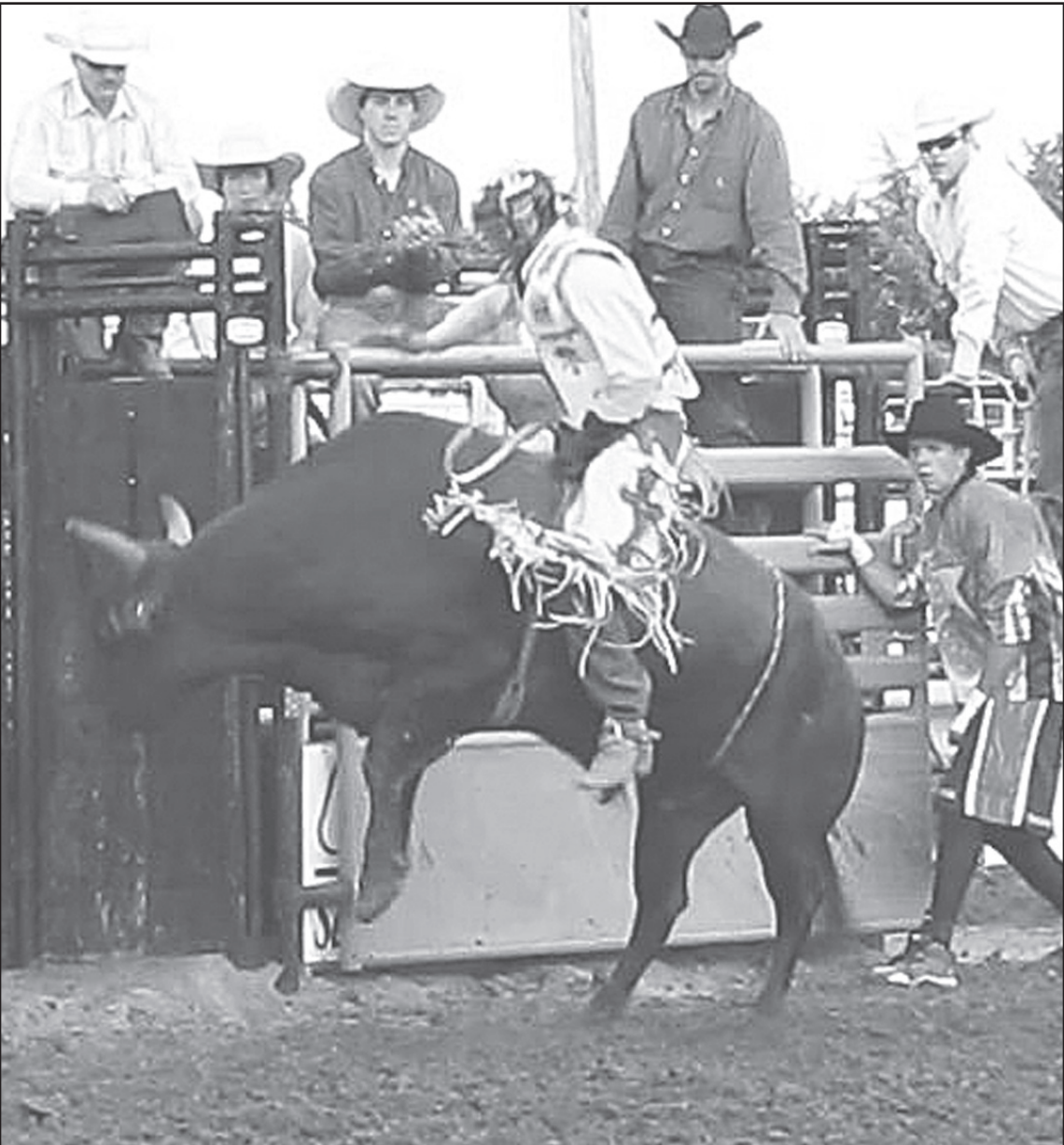


Bulls big winners in Western Plains Chute-Out



Big winner of the night was Josh Koschel of Greeley, Colo. He got an 80.5 for his first ride of the Brian Smith bull Spin Cycle, who lived up to his name. Koschel was the only rider to make it to the eight seconds in the short go getting the high score of the night, 89, on a Talbert Land and Cattle bull Sooner.



Kansas bull rider Kasey Hayes of Liberal, got a full ride on a Talbert Land and Cattle bull called Twenty-First Century, but was given a reride because he only scored 72. Unfortunately for Hayes he did not get to the eight seconds on the reride and took no score.

Based on the number of full rides on Wednesday night the bulls were the big winners as less than one-quarter of the Professional Bull Riders managed to make it to the eight second horn at the Western Plains Chute-Out.

One cowboy did manage to get two full rides and was the overall winner Josh Koschel who had an 80.5 in the first round on a bull called Spin Cycle from Brian Smith.

A total of 12 riders made it from the long go to the short go, and Koschel was the only cowboy in the short go to make it to the eight second horn getting the high score for the night of 89 on the Talbert Land and Cattle bull Sooner.

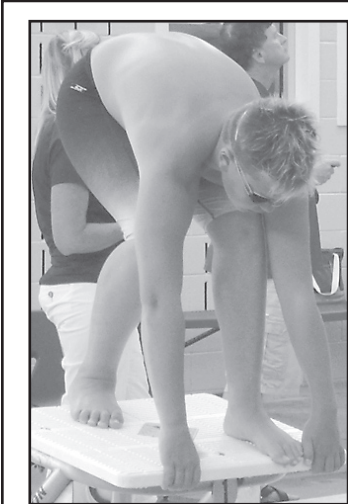
Previous Western Plains Chute-Out champions Dusty LaBeth of Archie, Mo., and Kasey Hayes of Liberal did not make it to the second round. Hayes had a full ride in the first round, but with a low score of 72 took a reride, and got bucked off to end with no score.

Others who had full rides in the opening round were Derek Creswell of Weatherford, Okla., Clay Taylor of Sayre, Okla., Dillon Tyner of Hoyt, Colo., Kenny Hickman of Neosho, Mo., Clint Connelly of Arnold, Neb., Jeston Mead of Ashland, Ryan McConnel of Colgate, Okla., Josh Call of Mullen, Neb., Alfonso Orozco of Salamanca, Guanajuato, Mex., Justin Koon of Grapevine, Ark., and Thad Newell of Muskegon, Okla.

This is the fourth year for the PBR to be in Goodland, and it was a packed house to watch the bull riders and the antics of Pumpkin Town Clown. Helping keep the cowboys safe in the arena was Goodland's own Tracy Weeter with the help of Dave Young.



One of the highest scores in the long go was Kenny Hickman of Neosho, Mo., who had an 81.5 riding the Talbert Land and Cattle bull Roxkin X. Unfortunately for Hickman he did not fare as well in the short go on Southwick/Rocky Mountain Rode bull Father Flanagan.



Goodland boy wins gold at Sunflower Games

Hagan Hoss of Goodland competed in swimming at the Sunflower State Games on Sunday, July 17, at the Capitol Federal Natatorium at Hummer Sports Park at Topeka.

Hoss swam the 50-meter freestyle placing sixth (38.49), 50-meter butterfly placing third (48.55), 100-meter freestyle placing fifth (1:28.35), 100-meter butterfly placing first

(1:49.80) and 100-meter freestyle placing second (3:20.44).

He won a gold, silver and bronze medal for the races he placed first, second and third in. He qualified to go to the American State Games to represent Kansas in 2013 at Hershey-Harrisburg, Pa.
