Icelandic exchange student reunites with class

Snaebjorb (Rosa) Bjartmarsdottir, had lived with Ed DeFries and went to school with his daughter Evalyn DeFries Harris in 1963-1964.

Harris has kept in contact with her Icelandic friend, and other classmates Lynn Foust Hildebrand of Salina and Leslie Frazier Bartels of Oberlin were wondering about their exchange friend when the volcano erupted a few years ago in southern Iceland that caused air traffic problems over England and Europe.

They managed to contact Rosa to find out she was OK and living on the western part of the island.

Rosa said her family supported her in coming to the reunion and she had flown from Iceland to Boston and then to Denver where she met with Evalyn Harris of Arvada, Colo.

Rosa said she had enjoyed most of her time going to school in Goodland, but at first she had a problem understanding what was being said. She said she could write English well, but had trouble understanding the spoken language.

"I was sitting in Mrs. Smith's class one day,

and suddenly like having my ears pop I could understand every word being said," she said."I almost fell off my chair."

Bartels and Hildebrand said they have been keeping up with Rosa on Facebook and through e-mails. They were excited to have Rosa come to the reunion.

The two classmates said they were shy when they were in high school and did not really hang out with Rosa or Harris, but have kept in touch since graduation and have been interested in helping connect with their classmates.

Rosa said she and her family are sheep farmers and she has four children three girls and a boy.

Rosa said they have Icelandic ponies on their farm and are very different from the horses in America.

Harris said her family (DeFries) lived about 25 miles northwest of Goodland.

Rosa said she does not get enough chances to speak English in Iceland, but is pleased she got to come. She said she has been in the U.S. for about a week and will return to Iceland on Wednesday.

The class had a special presentation for Rosa for being the one who came the furthest to attend the reunion, and she posed for pictures with her Facebook friends and her classmate she had lived with 47 years ago
