


All federal, state, county and city government offices, including the Post Offices in Goodland, Edson and Kanorado, the Sherman County transfer station and local banks will be closed on Friday.

High School presents Phantom of the Opera

a.betz@nwkansas.com Phantom of the Opera is an ambitious undertaking for a high school, but Goodland's students and adult support seem to be up to the task.

Thursday's dress rehearsal was a rough one, but with a week left to polish lines and hone the technical aspects, the Phantom cast will no doubt be presenting a gem to its audience on opening night Friday.

Andrew Lloyd Webber's musical version of the Phantom opened on Broadway in 1986, before this generation of thespians was born. And that's a good thing. At the time, the air, or certainly the airwaves, seemed saturated with "The Music of the Night" and all things Phantom. The student production comes at a time when even those who lived through the 80s can welcome a refresher course.

This production brings several strong points to recommend it. First, the voice of Abigail Jolly is up to the task of telling the story of Christine Daae, a promising young singer who attracts the attentions of the disfigured creature who lives in the cavern below the Paris Opera House. The acting talents of Caleb Fugleberg, who plays the Phantom, and Holton Witman, who plays

took on parts of missing cast, panbetween backstage and at various places in the auditorium seemingly at just under the speed of light.

Worth mentioning is strong community support in the form of members of the orchestra, stage manager Gordon Pettibone, and Dave Floyd, who was managing sound Thursday evening but is not listed as a member of the crew.

Webber's production of Phantom drew strong critical praise for its stage effects. The student versions were still under construction Thursday evening, but if the "Phantom in the mirror" effect being tested that night is a good example, audiences should flock to this production to see how a Kansas high school can credibly pull off a Broadway classic.

National emergency test set for Wednesday

Wednesday as part of the nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System.

The test on Wednesday is the first coordinated nationwide test by the Federal Emergency Management Agency with the Federal Communications Commission and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration of the Integrated Public Alert Warning System.

Locally Curtis Duncan, newsman for KLOE said the radio stations KLOE/KKCI/KWGB, and all other radio and television stations across the country are to activate their emergency test announcements at the same time. The test is scheduled to be at 2 p.m. Eastern Standard Time or Sherman County Central Dispatch Supervisor Crissy

Livengood said her office has not been asked to participate Dave Floyd, Meteorologist and severe weather coordinator at the Goodland National Weather Service said the office

will not do anything specific for this test. The nationwide test is not a pass or fail measure, federal of-

The Sherman County sirens will not sound at noon on ficials said, but it is an attempt to experiment to see how well a nationwide alert can be done and what needs to be improved. System participants include all broadcasters, satellite and digital

radio and television, cable television and wireline video providers who ensure the system is at a constant state of readiness.
