Fort Hays volunteers, dressed in period clothing, will provide music.

The Fort Hays String Academy will perform in the guardhouse on Friday evening. Also Friday Fort Hays State University's Sigma Alpha Iota music sorority will sing carols in the Visitor Center.

On Saturday Gary Hicks will demonstrate a spinning wheel in play trains in the blockhouse both kshs.org. nights.

Outside, visitors can board a horse-drawn wagon for a leisurely trip around the grounds. Rides are limited to 25 people at a time and will stop at the officer's home and the blockhouse. Behind the officers' home, hot, spiced cider from over a campfire will warm up the riders. Near the guardhouse, soldiers will be making hot fried apples over another campfire.

Admission fee is \$5 for adults and \$1 for students. Kansas Historical Foundation members and children 5 and under are admitted free. Visitors are requested to begin at the Fort Hays Visitor Center, 1472 Hwy 183 Alt, Hays.

2. Offer to help the person with grieving.

5. Invite the person to attend a religious service with you and your family.

6. Invite your loved one to your home for the holidays.

7. Offer to help your loved one prepare and mail holiday cards.

8. Ask if they are interested in volunteering with you during the holiday season. Doing something for someone else, such as helping at soup kitchens or working with children, may help them feel better about the holidays.

9. Donate a gift or money in memory of the person's loved one. 10. Give them hope that eventu-

ally they will enjoy the holidays again.

11. LISTEN. Active listening from friends is an important step to helping them heal. Don't worry about being conversational.... just listen.

12. Remind the person you are thinking of him or her and the loved one who died. Cards, phone calls and visits are great ways to stay in touch.
