Super committee fails to reach agreement

The failure of the "super committee" last week was not really unexpected, and the blame game continues to try to label President Obama as the culprit even though it is the Congress that failed to act in a responsible manner.

The gnashing of teeth and expected drop in the stock market that followed seemed to indicate the country has fallen off the cliff and are headed to disaster.

When the super committee announced they were not able to reach an agreement before Thanksgiving it had been touted as the automatic point when the previously agreed to cuts would become reality.

Now we are told the actual deadline for the massive cuts will be in December of next year. What we can expect is a continuation of the blame game as both Democrats and Republicans prepare for the election now less than a year away.

The options the country faces are not fun, but everyone agrees we need to find a way to cut the deficit and balance our budget. To do this cuts will have to be made in both the entitlement programs and defense plus the government must find a way to increase income through some sort of tax reform that will raise taxes on the very top 1 percent.

Already the defense supporters are saying any cuts will devastate the military and make it impossible to maintain America's position as the world's defender. Part of the cuts actually will come from winding down our two wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. A large portion of the deficit comes from the 10 years of war we have been waging. When the soldiers come home the country will have another problem as they begin to look for jobs not related

The other dire prediction is Congress will not allow the Bush tax cuts to end because that would cause a hugh tax increase for everyone and hit the middle class plus those in the top income brackets. The flip side is allowing the tax cuts to expire would cut the deficit by about \$4.8 trillion and the other required cuts would add another \$1.2 trillion.

Most economists agree this is the kind of effort the country needs to really address the country's debt, but the shock to the economy could trigger an even deeper recession or depression. The expectation is the country could eventually recover, but how long it would take and how high unemployment might go are unknown factors.

Those on the extreme right want big cuts in the entitlement programs such as Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security. Cuts have been proposed for all three including raising the age of eligibility and tightening the rules to reduce the number of people who qualify for the Medicaid program.

For those who have been paying into Social Security for more than 40 years of working the notion of cutting the benefits is horrifying, and would create quite a backlash probably for both political parties.

The failure of the super committee has put a spotlight on the non-performance of our Congress and the ideological barriers both sides have created over the past 10 years. The answers are not going to be easy, and it will take better understanding on all sides to find a way to wind our way through the sticky political rhetoric over the next 12 months.

Doing nothing will accomplish debt reduction on a devastating level, but will put us in an economic slide worse than what we are working our way out of presently even if on a slow basis. -Tom Betz

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
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Old cookbook still has what you need
