# Goodland The Star-News / Friday, January City commission approves incentive

kbottrell@nwkansas.com The Goodland City Commission approved an incentive for Crop Production Services' expansion at its meeting Tuesday. The city agreed to pay 70 percent of the cost to relocate the lines at the construction site, which comes to a little more than \$7,200. Economic Development Director Michael Solomon said this incentive is similar to what has been offered to other companies in the past.

The new facility, on the west side of Goodland, will have more office space and more storage. Commissioner Bill Finley asked if the company is going to be hiring more people for the expanded office. Justin Quain, operations manager, said they have moved some personnel from another office to Goodland, and there is the potential for hiring more in the future.

• Heard a report from Mayor Garcia, who said the first round of electronic city utility bills have gone out. However, there are only about 30 people signed up, and the city is hoping to eventually have more. The cost of postage for city bills is almost \$700 a month, he said, and sending out bills over the Internet would reduce that.
