Bomb scare forces school evacuation

kbottrell@nwkansas.com Students at Goodland High School had an unexpected field trip to the Northwest Tech campus as a bomb threat forced an evacuation of the high school building Friday morning.

The first call came into the dispatch office at 7:22 a.m. Police Chief Cliff Couch said a faculty member found writing in a stall in an upstairs bathroom that indicated there was a pipe bomb in the building.

Students and staff were evacuand organized. At 8 a.m. they were taken to Northwest Tech. Goodland Police, the Sherman County Sheriff's office, the Kansas Highway Patrol and the county attorney's office blocked off traffic around the school and

set up a command post at 11th

City planning big water line replacement project

kbottrell@nwkansas.com The Goodland City Commission gave City Manager Doug Gerber the go-ahead on Jan. 16 to start working on a multi-million dollar water line replacement project.

Gerber told the commission that although the rate of water loss is now under 20 percent, that number is still too high. The city has been talking about a water project for some time, and he had his staff identify which long it would take to finish the projareas have the most need.
