He served in the Marine Corps and with the Hutchinson Police Department before joining the Highway Patrol. Adam Catlin's older sister Victoria, who is deceased, was also born in Goodland. Another sister Melissa was born in California.

While in Goodland, Catlin said he wanted to stop at his old home at 1502 Texas Ave. and call an old friend of his father, Jack Armstrong.

He said he saw his first movie here at The Sherman Theatre "The Empire Strikes Backs."

Katherine Eppich's parents, John and Lois, lived in Goodland for a shorter period of time. Goodland was

the first teaching posts the couple had after graduating from Fort Hays State University. She said she was born Nov. 11, 1976, in the Goodland hospital. Her father taught third grade at West Elementary School and her mother was a Title 1 teacher at Central Elementary School. They moved the summer after she was born.

# Salina Catholic charity changes name

Catholic Charities of Salina has changed its name to better reflect the widespread geographic territory it serves.

Effective June 1, the agency will use the name Catholic Charities of Northern Kansas. "For years we've grappled with the idea," said Dr. Karen Hauser, chief executive officer of the social services agency of the Catholic Diocese of Salina.

While the name coincides with the diocese's name, she said, it doesn't reflect either's territory.

"Our presence is also elsewhere, not just

Salina," Hauser said.

The agency and the diocese serve a 31-county area that stretches from the Colorado line on the west to Manhattan and Hanover on the east. She, her board and her staff determined after debating the issue that "northern Kansas" best reflected the region served.

Other Catholic Charities agencies have taken a similar approach.

The Salina-based agency has branch offices in Manhattan, Concordia and Hays. Catholic Charities provides adoption and birth parent services, emergency assistance, counseling,

legal immigration assistance, Hispanic services and family strengthening programs.

The name change will be gradual, Hauser said. Stationery, brochures and other information won't be changed until new supplies are printed.

"We're very frugal. We have to be," Hauser said.

# Colorado Parks and Wildlife offers weekend camp in late June

FLAGLER – Area youth will have a chance to experience a weekend of free outdoor learning at Flagler State Wildlife Area in Colorado. The state Parks and Wildlife Department is hosting the first Flagler Outdoor Adventure the weekend of June 29, 30 and July 1.

Things get going at noon on Friday, June

29, and run until 5 p.m. on Sunday, July 1. Outdoor skills training and educational workshops will be offered throughout the weekend.

The weekend slate of activities includes opportunities for families with kids over the age of 10 to camp, earn a hunter education card, practice shooting sports in a safe

environment and learn outdoor skills from Parks and Wildlife staff.

All youth participating must be accompanied by an adult but the whole family is welcome to come along and enjoy the Outdoor Adventure. A camping area will be set up and Colorado Parks and Wildlife staff and volunteers will be providing meals

for registered participants throughout the weekend.

The Flagler State Wildlife Area is located

east of the community of Flagler in Kit Carson County. The wildlife area is a youth-only hunting area but is open to the public for camping, hiking, fishing and wildlife viewing. # Discover the science behind Star Wars at Wichita's Exploration Place museum

In Star Wars' cinematic galaxy far, far away, landspeeders replace cars, spaceships replace planes, and Droids live and work side-by-side with humans.

While these modes of transport and robots were merely science fiction when Star Wars debuted in 1977, today they don't seem so far-fetched.

In the Star Wars:® Where Science Meets Imagination national traveling exhibit, which opened at Exploration Place on May 26, visitors will see how closely science and fantasy work together and investigate the real science behind the fantasy technology.

**EXHIBIT HIGHLIGHTS**  
Visitors will discover the Star Wars universe in this 10,000 square foot exhibit - the largest Exploration Place has ever hosted - that is filled with hands-on interactives, concentrating on two technology themes: Getting Around (transportation), and Robots and People (how people and robots relate to each other). The exhibit also includes more than 80 props, models and costumes from the films.

## Getting Around

- After examining Luke Skywalker's original landspeeder from Star Wars Episode IV: A New Hope, visitors can sit in a hovercraft vehicle and experience what it is like to float on air.

- "Jump to lightspeed" in a replica of the Millennium Falcon cockpit as a multimedia presentation explores what is known about our own galaxy in a breathtaking experience to the edge of the universe.

- Visitors will experiment with magnetic levitation in the MagLev Engineering Design Lab. Visitors can imagine, create and test their own floating MagLev cars as they propel them along a magnetic track.

## Robots and People

- Visitors will become robot de-

signers in the Robot Engineering Design Lab. They will select wheels or treads and experiment with sensors and programs the robot uses to navigate through a course.

- Visitors will meet the C-3PO and R2-D2 characters and explore how people related to robots in Star Wars.

Real-world robots will be examined and how they navigate, sense and understand the world around them while communicating in very sophisticated ways.


