

# Junior varsity Cowgirls beat Oberlin 33-25

The Goodland High School junior varsity girls basketball team outshined their varsity teammates this week with a 33-25 win over Oberlin in the Colby Junior Varsity Tournament on Monday.

The Cowgirls put in 11 points in the first quarter and held Oberlin to just one. Sophomore Jordan Knitig put in a pair of buckets. Freshman Nicole Sederstrom also made a bucket and sunk two free throws. Freshman Carlee Cooper put in two free throws and freshman Kate-Lynn King put in one. Oberlin's only point came from a free

throw. However, the Lady Red Devils returned the favor in the second quarter, putting in 10 and holding the Cowgirls scoreless. The score was tied at 11 at the end of the half.

In the third quarter, Cooper put in six buckets, but missed three free throws. Sophomore Breanna Garrett put in two and sophomore Mara Kling hit a three pointer. They outscored Oberlin 11-8, leading by three going into the fourth quarter.

The Cowgirls continued to outscore Oberlin in the fourth, putting in 11 points to

the Lady Red Devils' six. Kling hit another three pointer. King put in two buckets and Garrett, Cooper and Sederstrom put in one free throw each. The Cowgirls won 33 to 25.

The girls were scheduled to face McCook in the championship game Thursday night.

The junior varsity Cowboys had less success against Cheylin on Monday, losing 46-35.

The boys outscored the Cougars 11 to seven in the first. Junior Ruben Lazaro,

freshman Kolt Trachsel, senior Caleb Fugleberg, and sophomores Connor Simpson and Zach Miller each put in two-point shots. Fugleberg also sank a free throw.

The Cougars doubled their score in the second, leaving the Cowboys in the dust. Simpson, Fugleberg and junior Cooper Slough each put in two pointers. Fugleberg again sank a free throw to end the half down 21-18.

The Cowboys had only five more points in the third to Cheylin's 11. Fugleberg stayed consistent, again putting in a two-pointer

and a free throw. Simpson added two. Miller missed a pair of free throw attempts.

Down 32-23 going into the fourth quarter, the Cowboys stepped things up, but so did the Cougars. Trachsel hit a three-pointer. Junior Cy Paxton put in two buckets and hit two free throws. Slough made two out of four free throw attempts and Miller hit a free throw to end the game down 46-35.

The Cowboys were scheduled against Colby in the second round on Thursday.



## Goodland students sign with Kansas colleges

Goodland High School seniors Riley Oharah (above) and Austin Avelar (right) signed to play football next year at Kansas community colleges. Oharah, a fullback and linebacker, signed to play with Butler Community College in El Dorado. Butler's football team has won six National Junior Collegiate Athletics Association titles, the most recent in 2008. He was accompanied by his parents Dean and Daylene Oharah. Avelar, a kicker, signed with Dodge City Com-

munity College. The Conquistadors just finished a record-setting season, making the Region IV playoffs for the first time since 2005, and defeating Garden City Community College for the first time since 1986. Dodge City coach Bob Majerski was named Coach of the Year by the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference. Avelar was accompanied by his mother Tara Avelar.

## Sign up now for hunter education and field day March 16-17

Need to get your hunter education certificate? Sign up for the fourth annual Northwest Beginners Pheasant Hunt and Hunter Education event Friday and Saturday, March 16 and 17 at the Kuhrt Ranch, 2725 Road 77, Edson.

The event includes a hunter education test that Friday, which fulfills state hunting regulations, and a field day that Saturday.

Students must complete an online class before going to the testing session on Friday. 31 students completed the test last year. All 31 passed with 13 getting perfect scores. To take the online class, visit the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism and click on the education link. The class takes four and a half hours depending on a per-

son's reading and comprehension level. At the end of every chapter is a test that must be completed, printed and brought to the testing session.

Those who pass the test are invited to stay at the hunting lodge on the Kuhrt Ranch that night and participate in Saturday's field day.

An application is required as well as a \$20 returnable deposit. Sherman, Cheyenne and Wallace County Game Warden Mike Hopper said space is limited to 30 people, and there has already been plenty of interest.

Hopper said students are usually evenly divided between men and women, older and younger. People from around Kansas, as well as other states, come to Goodland for the event, he said, partly because

the hunter education portion fulfills requirements of other states.

Hunter education students do not have to stay for the field day Saturday. Those who stay are broken up into five and sent to different stations.

One station last year was a hike with Josh Williams of the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks. Williams took the students through several "shoot or not to shoot" scenarios and gave them a practical look at issues about where to hunt and what to do to make sure the person has the proper permission to hunt on an open field.

Another station was the clay bird

live shooting platform. The live fire gave each participant a chance to try a different type of shotgun and fire from different elevations.

The third station had the students learn how to clean a bird. Instructors gave direction and explained the cleaning steps as well as the importance of being able to identify the bird up until it is cooked.

The fourth station was a combi-

nation of gun cleaning and alcohol avoidance put on by Kansas Highway Patrol Troopers Josh McQuitty, Perry Frey and Joe Greene. The troopers explained how to clean a shotgun and demonstrated the best cleaning methods. As part of the class the troopers talked about the dangers of mixing alcohol with hunting and used the "drunk" goggles to show each person what

the effects of alcohol were on their ability to function.

The fifth station was a live bird hunt using dogs and an area where a number of birds had been planted to ensure the hunters had a good hunting experience. The birds were planted for each hunt.

Hopper said he would not be able to offer the event each year without his local sponsors.

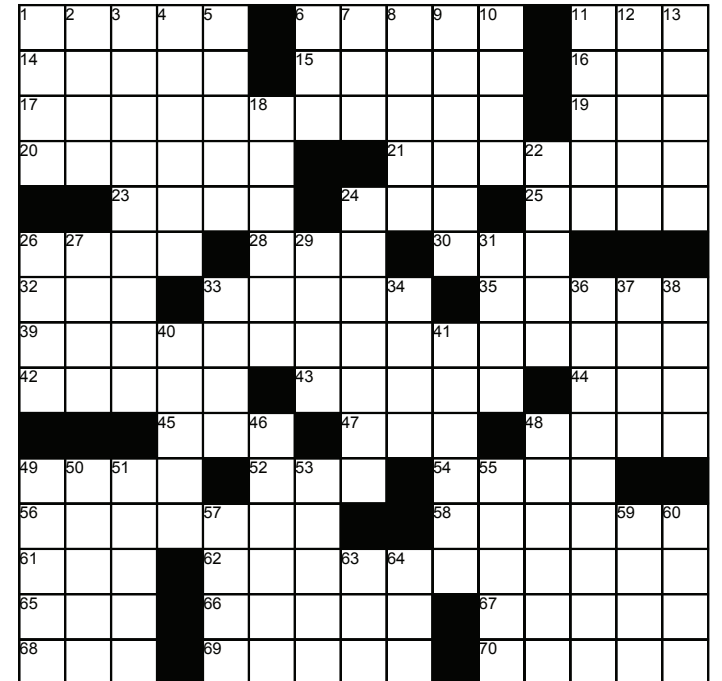

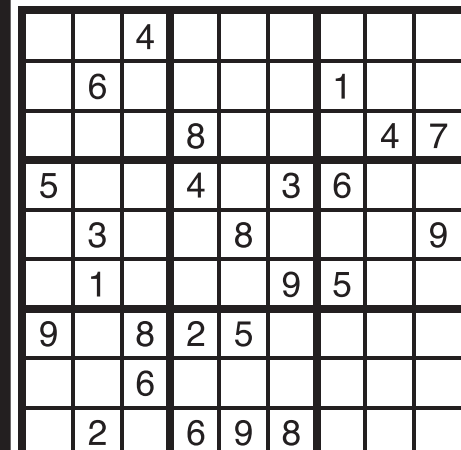
