Scott City opened things with a putback and another bucket to take a quick 4-0 lead. Taylen Smith put in the Cowboys first points with a putback. Gage Ihrig put in a three pointer to take a 5-4 lead.

Scott City put in a layup to take back the lead. Gage Ihrig put in another three pointer to go up 8-6, the Cowboys' last lead of the night. The Beavers would go on an 8-0 run to lead 14-8 at the end of the first quarter.

Scott City scored the opening two points of the second quarter, making it a 10-point run before Smith put in a jumper to make the score 16-10.

After another two pointer from Scott City, Gage Ihrig put in his third three pointer of the night to make it 18-13. Scott City put in a two pointer and the Cowboys answered with two to make it 20-15.
