"Giants: African Dinosaurs," will open at Fort Hays State University's Sternberg Museum of Natural History on Saturday and will run until Aug.5.

"Giants" provides clues to the affected dinosaur evolution.

Besides new and unusual dinosaurs, Sereno's team stumbled on the world's largest crocodile, the 40foot-long "Sarcosuchus," dubbed 4 to 12.
