# Alliance calls for historic nominations

TOPEKA—The Kansas Preservation Alliance's Endangered Places program is calling for nominations of endangered historic properties statewide. This program raises awareness of distressed historic resources, such as buildings, bridges, cultural landscapes, and so forth. The nomination form can be found online at [www.kpalliance.org](http://www.kpalliance.org). Nomination forms are due March 24. Send forms to Kansas Preservation Alliance, Box 2506, Topeka, 66601.

Started in 1993, the program has listed 91 different properties statewide.

"Of the various resources listed over the years, we are proud to report that 45 have been saved and/or rehabilitated," said Kerry Davis, chair of the Endangered Places committee. "Unfortunately though, 14 have been lost and 31 are still threatened and we need the public's help."

The Endangered Places Program

serves as a representative sampling of the state's most endangered historic resources. Endangerment is defined as the threat of demolition, significant deterioration, vandalism, alteration and/or loss of historic setting.

"It's our belief that this program draws attention and awareness to the plight Kansas' historic resources. At the same time, it encourages the community to come together to preserve its history," said Davis.

The Kansas Preservation Alliance is dedicated to preserving historic places in Kansas. The alliance strives to raise awareness of historic preservation by advocating, educating and creating alliances. Founded in 1979, the organization has implemented many programs such as the annual Awards for Excellence and the Endangered Places Program. The alliance is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization. practice did not allow abortions and did not take federal funds.

Paul is also a veteran, having served in the U.S. Air Force as a flight surgeon.

The letter said Paul had never voted for a tax increase or to raise the debt ceiling. Paul has a plan to eliminate five unconstitutional federal agencies and cut \$1 trillion from the budget in the first year without cutting social security or national defense.

John Topliff read a letter for Santorum's campaign. The letter said the nation cannot limit government without a moral code to restrain people. Those moral codes were the basis of the Constitution.

"We do not need compromise," Topliff read. "We need a warrior.

We need a candidate that is beyond reproach."

With crippling debt and growing threats around the world, the letter said that Americans, "have a special opportunity to catapult a true conservative warrior."

Topliff added his own statement after reading the letter. He said for his business he has flown many high-profile people around the country, including recently the president of the National Rifle Association. From their conversations, Topliff said he concluded that the country has reached a crossroads that it may not be coming back from.

Robertta Bretz also spoke on behalf of Santorum, saying she liked what she saw, and that she feels Santorum would make good decisions.

Laurie Klemm spoke on behalf of former Gov. Mitt Romney.

She said she has recently been speaking to Kansas Secretary of State Kris Kobach, who is backing Romney. Kobach is concerned about voter fraud and immigration issues, she said, and Romney has also been taking a stand on immigration. As governor of Massachusetts, he vetoed a bill that would have allowed illegal immigrants to attend college.

"When he was governor, 85 percent of the state legislature were Democrats," she said, "and he cut spending 19 times."

Massachusetts was also one of the first states to allow gay marriage, she said, but Romney found a law that allowed him to forbid clerks from issuing marriage licenses to non-Massachusetts

residents.

Klemm said she believed Romney to be a man of faith, integrity and character.

Volunteers passed out ballots. Shields said that although there were only four candidates still in the race, the ballots still had the names of all of the candidates who filed in Kansas. Balloting was done at 10 a.m., 11 a.m. and noon.

Shields said she hoped everyone would get behind whichever candidate wins. She said after the caucus that one volunteer told her that although she was not necessarily persuaded by what she heard, she now had better confidence that whomever is elected will be a great president.
