Peonies also detest which was introduced more than colors of coral, salmon and yellow, and their versatile flower forms offer the new generation of flower gardeners real beauty in both the garden and the vase. Their showy structure, and absolutely out of this world fragrance, can't help but win you over and entice you to plant more of them.

Horticulturists tell us to plan carefully when we plant peonies. We should not plant them near trees that will give them unwanted shade. They should always be planted in well drained soil because they don't white blooms with a few red streaks,

being transplanted to a new area. Their six to seven foot roots make moving them difficult. They should be fertilized just once a year, ideally in the spring while they are growing and using up soil nutrients. When the foliage turns brown after that first hard freeze in the fall, cut the old stalks back to the ground, and expect it to be even more beautiful the following spring.

One of the most popular peonies in this area is one called Festival Maxima, complete with elegant 150 years ago.

Yellow peonies are a bit more rare, but there is a new one called Yellow Crown that offers blooms up to 8 inches across under proper growing conditions, and can be ordered for \$49.95 per root, or 4 for only \$159.95. Most established cultivars of peonies are priced as low as \$5.95 each.

Please do not resist the urge to plant a few peony roots this fall. You'll love 'em, and those that follow you will forever be grateful!

Telemarketers target victims using cell phones

sands of Kansans have registered their phone numbers with the Do Not Call Registry, cutting back on the number of telemarketing calls they receive. Unfortunately, this has not stopped telemarketers from finding new ways to violate the law and get your money or personal

If you haven't registered yet, you can do that by calling 1-888-382-1222 or going to www.ag.ks. gov/nocall. Once you have been on the registry for 31 days, most businesses are prohibited from calling you to attempt to sell you a product or service. Exceptions include calls soliciting charitable donations, calls concerning political candidates or issues and calls from businesses with which you have a prior relationship.

Scam artists will also often try to target victims over the telephone. Here are some of the latest telephone scams reported to our office:

Tech support

Consumers throughout the state have reported being called by some-

for Microsoft or other software companies. The caller tells the consumer that his or her software license has expired and must be renewed. They or direct the consumer to a website where they can enter their payment information. In addition to gaining information. access to your credit card or bank account number, these sites can also be a source of viruses which allow the scammer to steal even more of your personal information.

Software companies will not contact you over the phone to offer unsolicited technical support. If you do need technical assistance, contact your software provider directly by using a number provided with your software or through the company's legitimate website.

Text messages

A growing number of companies are using text messages to inform their customers of sales and special offers. This can be a useful marketing tool for companies, and valuable to customers, as long as they have opted to receive these messages. If

Over the past few years, thou- one claiming to be technical support you receive unsolicited text message offers you have not signed up for, be suspicious. Be especially wary of text messages claiming you have won a prize and asking you to may ask for payment over the phone respond to claim it. This is just another way scammers can try to gain access to your money and personal

Scammers are also getting around no-call laws by finding ways for you to contact them. This may come in the form of unsolicited postcards or emails offering extended car warranties, magazine subscriptions or get-rich-quick or work-from-home schemes. Abide by the old saying,
