

Mustangs finish year by smashing records

The Grant Junior High School track teams capped an impressive season with a record-breaking performance at the Great West Athletic Conference meet Saturday at Holcomb.

The seventh grade girls and boys broke 12 school records and seven league records, tying two more league meet records.

New league records include: Margaux Thompson in the 100-meter hurdles with 18.59 seconds. Kyndell King in the shot put with 36 feet, 5.5 inches.

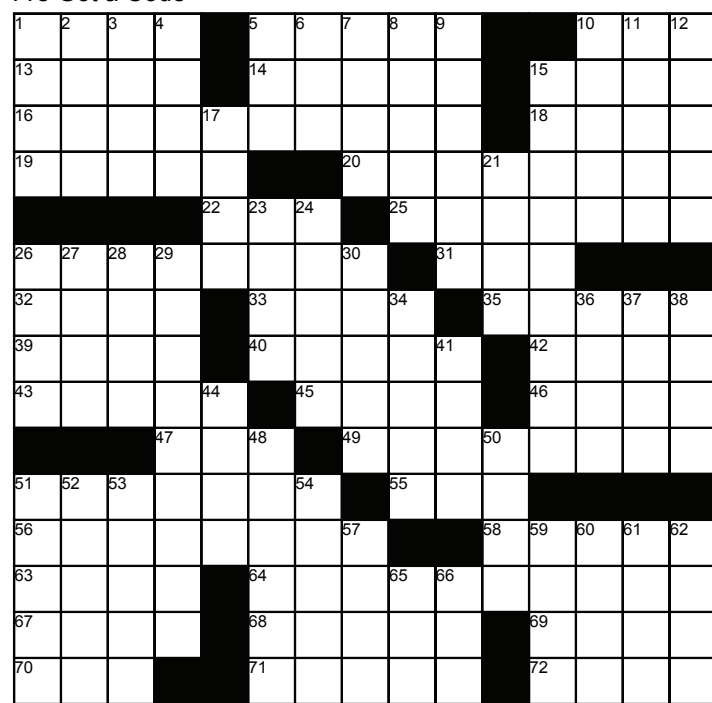
