Election 2012 Candidate forum set for Tuesday

Van Gogh taken down on Wednesday for repair

nbetz49@nwkansas.com Cameron Cross, the Canadian artist responsible for Goodland's famous Van Gogh painting, is in town to repair and revitalize his giant painting.

Cross and city officials weren't sure how to do the long-planned maintenance, but settled on removing the painting from the Big Easel and laying it on the ground. Taking down the Van Gogh sunflower painting was a matter of attaching it to a crane and then cutting the more than 30 feet of welds holding it in place for the last 11 years to bring it down to allow Cross to repair and repaint the artwork.

The strong welds slowed the cutting process as it was hard to get them to break loose, and it took several trips up and down the easel to get them free.

Those watching from the ground could tell when one of the welds broke loose with a popping sound. In one case a weld at the top made a big popping sound and a steel wedge fell to the ground.

That was not the last weld holding the painting, and it had been lowered to the ground.

Bryant Nemechek of Nemechek Welding had to get to one more about half way down before the whole painting popped free with a shudder shaking the easel and put the 22,000 pound load fully on the crane rented from Woofter Construction.

When the painting came loose city employees helped guide the painting to a place on the ground to the east of the easel where Cross will work on cleaning, repairing and repainting the Van Gogh sunflower painting.

Plans had been made on Tuesday with attachment of two brackets to attach to crane straps and a couple of braces under the painting to insure it was put back in

the same place. The crane had been pre-positioned to be sure everything was in place.

Early Wednesday morning the crews arrived and began the process about 6 a.m., and the last weld popped loose about noon. Once it was loose it did not take many minutes to swing it to the east and bring it down to the ground.

Helping Bryant were his father, Greg, and John Buckner.

Once the welds were cut and the painting was detached, a crane was used to lower it to the ground.
