# 26th annual Flatlander Festival starts Friday

The 2012 Flatlander Festival, the biggest fashioned "Plinko" game. event on the Goodland calendar, will bring thousands of visitors to town this weekend.

With hotels filled to overflowing in advance, the Flatlander Festival brings in thousands of people, thousands of dollars in revenue for area businesses, and plenty of tax money for local government.

In addition to the Brick Top Cruisers Car Show and the Northwest Kansas Bike Show, there are many attractions throughout the weekend. Things kick off with the Flatlander Fall Classic car races at 5:30 p.m. Friday and 4:30 p.m. Saturday at the Sherman County Speedway.

The Main Street festival begins Saturday morning with a 5K run sponsored by the Goodland Activity Center. Registration begins at 6:30 a.m. at Eighth and Main, with a 7:30 a.m. start time. The street festival begins runs from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Some of the festival attractions include vendor booths, which often have food, crafts and games. The Northwest Kansas Technical College booth will have a live-action Angry Birds game built entirely by students. Players will fire bean-bag birds out of custom-made sling shots and try to knock over cans painted like pigs. The college will also have an old-

The Scruffy Dog Contest, a local favorite, will begin at 11 a.m. at the grandstands at 12th and Main. At noon at the grandstands awardwinging singer Lulu LaFever will perform. There will also be open mic musical from 1 to 4 p.m.

In the past, the Flatlander Festival has attracted such spectacles as a National Guardsponsored racing car. This year, the Army National Guard is bringing the Patriot Bike, a custom-made chopper. Also new this year, The Basement will have a beer garden its building at 17th and Main.

At 3 p.m., The Buffalo Guys will hold Buffalo Patty Bingo at 114 W. 12th St.

The street festival will close with a motorcycle and car parade at 8 p.m. on Main Street.

On Sunday will be the Picnic in the Park at Chambers Park from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. At the picnic will be the Flatlander Horseshoe Tournament at noon. There is a \$10 entry fee. There will also be free lunch, live music and vendor booths.

The 26th annual Car Show will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday. There will be early registration and a meal for car owners Friday from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at 1311 Main St. Registration will reopen Saturday from 8 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The show itself opens at 8 a.m.

There are three classes: "Stock," with no cutting or extra holes and no modification to the cover; "Custom," with paint or after market covers allowed; and "Outlaw" where anything goes as long as a portion of the valve cover is identifiable.

Things continue Sunday morning with a "Show and Shine" at 8 a.m. at the Goodland Elks Lodge, 1523 Arcade. There will be a fun walk and games from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. and an awards ceremony at 11 a.m.

The Brick Top Cruisers club has been holding a car show at the Flatlander Festival for the last four years, although annual car shows have been a fixture in Goodland since well before then. They hold events throughout the year.
