Goodland couple were on stricken ship

On Sunday, Feb. 10, the Carnival Triumph, a cruise ship heading back to America from Mexico, lost power. It would take tugboats five days to tow it Mobile, Ala., during which time the passengers had to make do with minimal power, minimal hot food, no air conditioning, and few functioning toilets.

Goodland resident Scott Angelos and his wife Shelly were on board the Triumph when it lost power. Despite the horror stories in the news, Angelos said the event was more of an inconvenience than anything else.

The ship left Galveston, Texas, on Thursday, Feb. 7, and was supposed to go to the Mexican island of Cozumel and return to port on Monday, Feb. 11. It reached Cozumel that Saturday without any trouble. While on the island, Angelos said, one passenger had to be taken away in an ambulance and was not able to

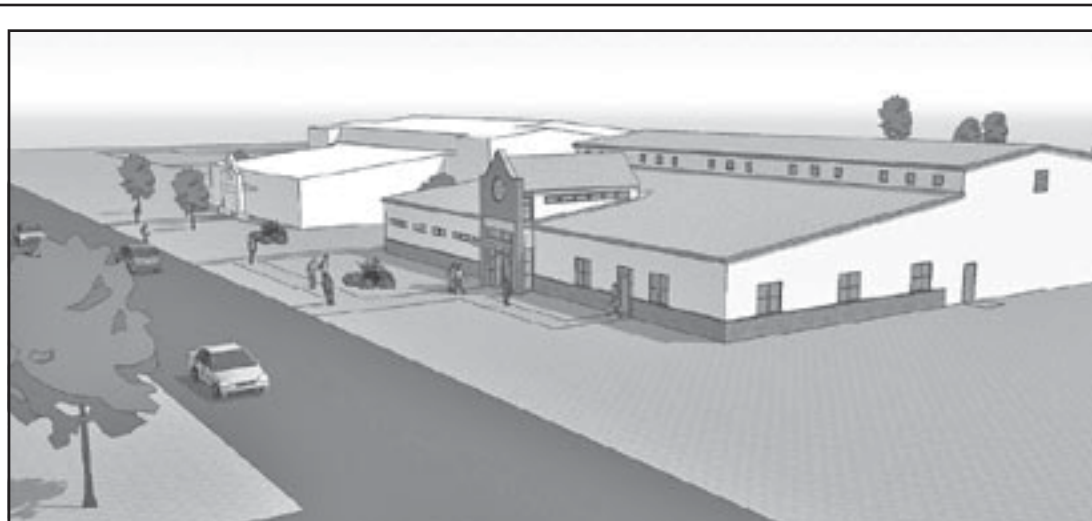
rejoin the ship. "We were thinking 'oh, that poor person,'" he said. "Turns out she was the lucky one."

The ship left Cozumel, and then early Sunday morning Angelos heard a call over the ship's intercom telling "Alpha Team" to assemble in one of the engine rooms. At 6:30 a.m., the engines shut down and the power turned off. Angelos said emergency power came on, powering emergency lights in the corridor.

"We were told there was a situation," he said. "They tried to keep people calm, telling us there was no danger."

Angelos and the other passengers learned later that there had been a fire in one of the engine compartments. The ship was dead in the water, but not in danger of sinking. Angelos said some people were putting their

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KanCare deadline is Thursday

Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services Shawn Sullivan today reminded KanCare participants that the Thursday deadline for changing their Managed Care Organization health plan is rapidly approaching. KanCare participants who wish to stay with their current managed care do not need to take any action. Those wishing to change to a different health plan before the deadline may call (*66) 305-5147 for assistance. This opportunity is open for participants who were enrolled in the program as of Jan. 1, 2013, or earlier.

The next opportunity for current participants to change the health plan will be at the end of this year, when the next open enrollment period begins. Those who become

eligible for KanCare later in the year will have a 90-day period in which they can change their health plan, and then, one year after that, will have another opportunity to change. More information on the three KanCare health plans is available at www.kancare.ks.gov/choosing_a_plan.htm.

Or is you need face-to-face assistance, a new entity called the Aging and Disability Resource Center, is a resource that is part of KanCare. This companion to KanCare offers a statewide network of counselors who provide options counseling, information and guidance to Kansans of all ages and abilities - and income levels, not just KanCare participants - through a single point of entry. The 11 Area Agencies on Aging in

Kansas provide resource services in 105 counties across Kansas. These include information, referral and assistance, options assistance counseling and functional assessments.

The resource center's function as a visible and trusted resource throughout the state, providing simplified access to long-term services and supports as well as publicly administered programs such as Medicaid.

"Aging and Disability Resource Center's are empowering older adults and the disabled to make informed choices about their services and supports," said aging secretary Sullivan. "They streamline access and ensure that each individual's needs are being met. The Aging and Disability Resource Center can

Death penalty must remain an option

If there was ever a case where the death penalty must be carefully considered, it is the taking shape in Colorado right now.

Prosecutors are deciding whether to pursue the death penalty in the case of James Holmes, who is accused of 166 counts of murder and attempted murder in last year's theater shooting in Aurora.

Colorado has been on something of a liberal binge lately, passing laws legalizing marijuana and making movements toward allowing same-sex unions. However, the death penalty still exists in Colorado. The state has executed just one person (in 1997), and there are three people sitting on death row now, but it remains an option.

The death penalty is something that should never be imposed lightly. It is the extreme and final measure of punishment available under the law, and should only be enacted in the most extreme of cases and should be carefully considered in every case.

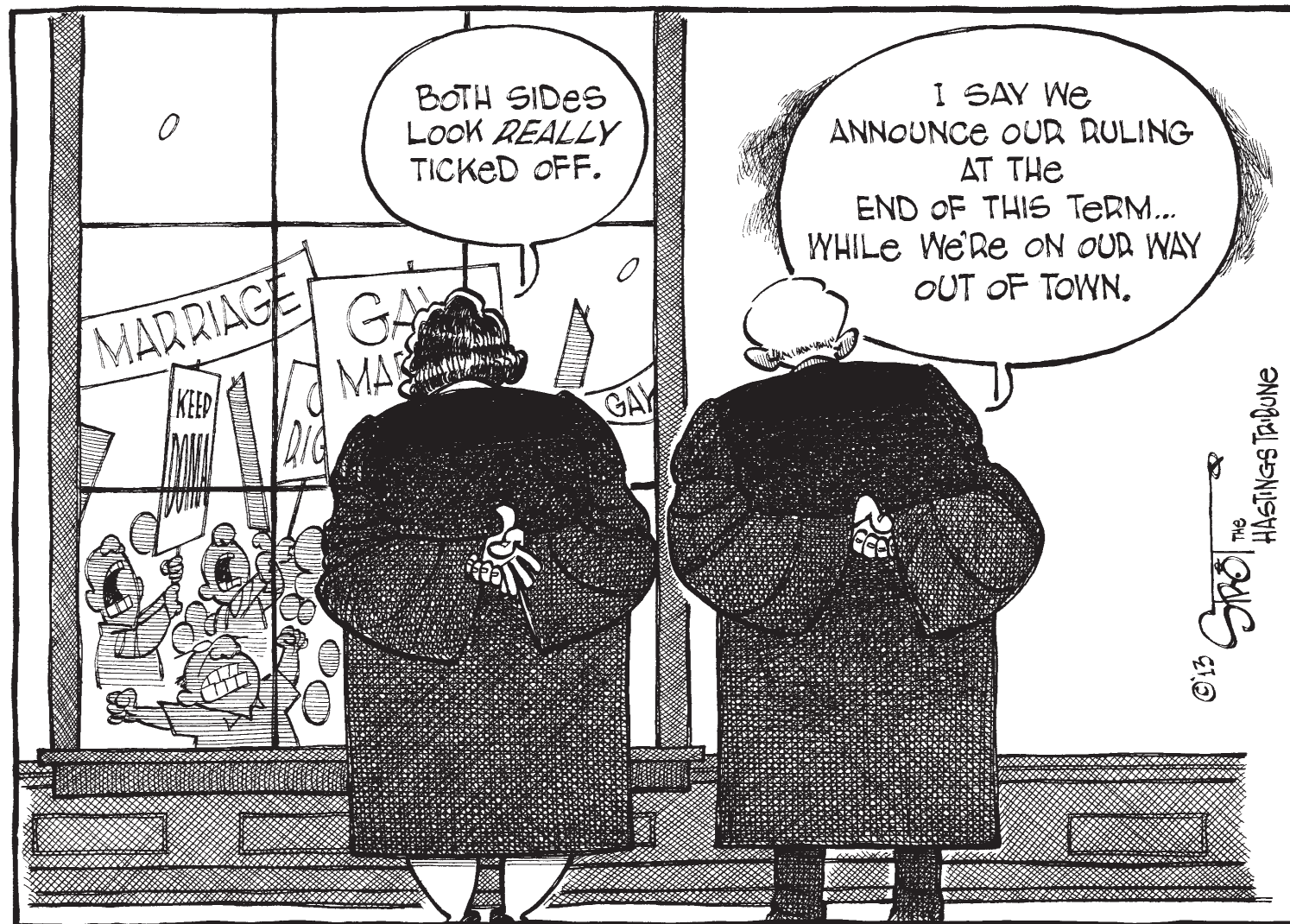
The problem in this case comes from the defense, which has said in court documents that it may plan to pursue an insanity defense. Most states as well as the federal courts have been reluctant to order executions for the mentally ill and are more likely to order treatment. However, the time when mental health treatment benefits society in cases like this is before something like the Aurora or Sandy Hook shootings occur. After the fact, it does little good. Even if Holmes were found insane by the court, can you imagine there were any circumstances where they would allow him back into society? What good would rehabilitation do.

This isn't Holmes' only method of defense. The prosecution has rejected an offer by the defendant to plead guilty and accept life in prison. They called it a tactic designed to generate publicity.

Society has a right to protect itself from those who would harm it. Crimes like mass shootings are incredibly harmful to society beyond the victims and their immediate families. How many people stayed away from the movies after Aurora? How many parents kept their kids home from school after Columbine? How many schools have tried to become fortresses after Sandy Hook. These terrorist acts rip at the very fabric of our way of life.

We must do all we can to try and prevent these crimes without infringing on the freedoms of law abiding citizens, but when one happens, what then? No punishment will bring back those who died, but society must still mete out punishment.

The death penalty is not the only option in this or any other case, but it should remain one of the options. —Kevin Bottrell



Budget process gives unique view of Senate

Snow was swirling outside my house with the winds and heavy snow bringing limbs down while my cat, Sammie, and I watched a unique scene in the U.S. Senate as the body worked early into the morning to pass a budget.

The Senators worked through more than 70 amendments from both sides, and the final vote came at 4:58 a.m. Eastern Time on Saturday to pass their first budget in four years on a narrow 50-49 vote. A total of 500 amendments had been proposed, but most did not make it to the floor for debate and vote.

Amendments from both sides were presented, and with short two minute debates they were either approved or defeated. As the hour got late the leaders from both parties asked for consensus and were able to move the process forward accepting about 30 of the amendments on a voice vote rather than having roll calls on each one.

For the final dozen or so amendment votes the senators were asked to actually be in their seats. That presented a special scene with the senators at their desks answering when their name was called. I am not sure when I last saw such a scene as for most votes senators gather on the floor in front of the clerk to give their vote and talk to other senators.

A request to allow the sitting senators to use their electronic devices while waiting for each vote received an objection so no one was allowed to use cell phones or tablets.

A number of the amendments made minor technical changes in wording in various portions of the budget.

A number of the amendments were attempts by Republican senators to make political statements or deal with outside issues by adding them to the budget.

An example was an amendment by Sen. Ted Cruz (R-Texas) who tried to reduce the money given to Egypt and to have it used for a missile defense on the east coast. His point was the rulers in Egypt are not friends of the U.S. The opposition said this was money already available, and such foreign relations issues did not fit in the budget. The amendment was defeated on a 74-25 vote.

Another Cruz amendment to provide for repeal of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act and the Health Care and Education

Reconciliation Act of 2010 and to encourage patient-centered reforms to improve health outcomes and reduce health care costs, promoting economic growth was defeated on a 54-45 mostly party line vote.

Sen. Jim Inhofe (R-Okla.) had an amendment to uphold Second Amendment rights and prevent the United States from entering into the United Nations Arms Trade Treaty passed by 53-46 vote.

A few minutes later Sen. Patrick Leahy's (D-VT) had an amendment to ensure the United States will not negotiate or support treaties that violate Americans' Second Amendment rights under the Constitution of the United States was agreed to by voice vote.

Sen. Pat Roberts (R-Kan.) presented an amendment to expedite exports from the United States through reform of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 in such a manner that greenhouse gas emissions produced outside the United States by any good exported from the United States are not subject to requirements of that Act agreed to by voice vote.

Sen. Debbie Stabenow (D-Mich.) had an amendment to protect Medicare's guaranteed benefit and to prohibit replacing guaranteed benefits with the House passed budget plan to turn Medicare into a voucher program passed by 96-3 vote.

Sen. Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) presented an amendment to protect women's access to health care, including primary and preventative health care, family planning and birth control, and employer-provided contraceptive coverage, such as was provided under the Affordable Care Act passed on party line 56-43 vote.

Sen. John Hoeven's (R-ND) amendment to promote investment and job growth in the United States manufacturing, oil and gas production, and refining sectors through the

construction of the Keystone XL Pipeline passed by on a 62-37 vote.

Sen. Joe Manchin's (D-W. Va) amendment to ensure abundant domestic energy sources and technologies can meet present and future greenhouse gas emissions rules approved by Unanimous Consent.

Sen David Vitter (R-La.) presented an amendment to ensure election integrity by requiring a valid government-issued photographic ID for voting in federal elections, but failed on a 54-44 vote.

Another Vitter amendment to end "Too Big To Fail" subsidies or funding advantage for Wall Street mega-banks (over \$500 billion in total assets) was approved on a 99-0 vote.

Watching the long procession of amendments and the short debates made one feel better about the future of the political process — especially in the Senate.

The budget will not be approved in the House. In their process the Senate voted down the House budget on a party line vote.

In many ways the Senate going through the process was a good exercise to focus attention on the country's financial situation and the options for moving forward. The best part was there was no filibuster and both sides agreed to keep the process moving through the early hours of Saturday morning to get to the final vote.

When the final vote was taken the senators lined up to walk past the clerk and then headed for the exits to go home for the Easter break. In the final vote no Republicans voted in favor and four Democrats voted against for the narrow 50-49 margin.

Next on the process is presentation by President Barack Obama of his proposed budget to be announced in April. It is expected to be different from both the House and Senate versions. Negotiations may be held between the House and Senate, but it is doubtful any major budget agreement will be reached.

Time will tell if the budget process will move things forward, but more important was the discussion by both Sen. Harry Reid, Democratic Leader, and Sen. Mitch McConnell, Republican leader, that the budget process was probably the best legislative action of the body in many years.

Legislature taking up budget, tax plan

Week ten proved to be very busy yet productive for the House with a passage of a budget and tax plan, setting the stage for the end of the session. The only requirement for the Legislature is to pass a budget each session. I have concerns about both but voted for them to get to conference.

The next stage for the session is for the House and Senate to meet in a conference committee. This is the process by which differences in bills are discussed and negotiations between different positions take place. Each chamber presents their bill and position along with what they like and don't like about the other chamber's bill. The top three members of each committee represent their respective chamber's position in the negotiations. This will be my first experience being on conference committees.

When both sides believe they have an equitable agreement, they submit their report back to their respective chambers and each body votes on the plan. If it passes both chambers, it goes to the governor for his signature or veto. If either house rejects the agreement, they go back to conference to find another agreement. The conference committee process happens for each bill which has differences from what the other chamber passed.

Some highlights from the past week: Kansas exports increased \$1.75 billion dollars since 2010. Exports from Kansas for 2012 were

\$11.66 billion. In the five state regions, the average of exports was 9.2 billion, placing Kansas squarely ahead of the regions average.

The House passed House Bill 2253, a very strong pro life bill which I voted for and the bill passed 92-31. No taxpayer dollars will be used to subsidize abortions.

I enjoyed talking with Senator Bill Bradley, the famous New York Knick basketball player this week. He was in the Capitol to discuss options for the Kansas Public Retirement Plan.

life jackets on and going to the lifeboat areas anyway.

It took about eight hours for the crew to be able to get into the engine room. Angelos said Sunday afternoon the passengers were told the ship couldn't make it back to port.

"A small tugboat came from Mexico on Monday morning," he said. "It couldn't do much more than nudge us around. A big tug got there Monday afternoon. It pulled from the front while the little tug kept us straight."

It would take five days to get to Mobile, Ala. Angelos said the emergency power meant there was no lighting in the rooms. There was running water - though not heated - but no air conditioning and only a few working toilets on the entire ship.

Angelos said he and his wife were fortunate to have an outside room. They could open the windows for fresh air. He said many people would drag mattresses into the hallways, on deck or by the lifeboats, any place with good ventilation.

"Most of us didn't feel like we were in life threatening danger," he said, "just inconvenienced."

Angelos said there was no hot food at first. The crew was able to keep some of the refrigerators going. The ship would get resupplied by other cruise ships, and sometimes the food would be

cooked on the other ship and sent over to the Triumph. However, trying to feed all 3,000 passengers with just a few servers made for long lines.

"It got smoother as we went along," he said.

The resupply operation was a bit difficult, Angelos said. The first time, the cruise ships used a lifeboat to ferry supplies, however the sea was swelling four to five feet, which made the lifeboat bang into the side of the ship. Later a tugboat with a crane was used to transfer supplies. By the third day the ship was within helicopter range of the mainland, and the coast guard sent a helicopter to carry supplies from one ship to the other.

As the ship got closer to port, the crew was able to get electricity to more places, including one of the elevators, a grill and the coffee machines.

"The coffee machines turned out to be a big deal," he said.

Angelos said he saw the best and worst of people on the cruise.

"Some people were miserable and complained, but some made the best of it," he said.

There were books and decks of cards available, he said. The crew performed very well during the voyage, he said, keeping people's spirits up and keeping kids occupied. Even some of the performers from the clubs, who had nothing to do without electricity, started serving food and helping with other shipboard duties.

Angelos said at first the passengers were un-

aware of the media frenzy surrounding the ship. The cruise ships are equipped with cell towers and internet, but without main power, these were not functioning. It was only when another cruise ship first came close to the Triumph that people were able to call out or access to internet, at which time they found out that the whole world was watching.

They saw a few news aircraft at first, he said, but as the ship got closer to shore it was followed almost constantly by new helicopters.

The ship got into port around midnight Thursday, Feb. 14. Most of the passengers were bussed to New Orleans where they were put up in a hotel for the night and flown out the next morning.

Three other Carnival ships, the Elation, Dream and Legend also ran into problems in the three weeks following the Triumph's return to port. Elation had a malfunction in its steering and had to be towed back to port. Dream lost power while docked and Legend had technical difficulties that affected its sailing speed. Carnival Cruise Lines has said the Triumph will be out of service until June, with 10 planned cruises cancelled. The company said Wednesday it will be improving its ships to function better on backup power.

Angelos said he'd been on seven cruises, including some with Carnival.

"I'd do it again," Angelos said. "We had a good time, it was just a longer cruise than we had planned."
