Volunteers pack food for needy

Excitement filled the air for the core group of Goodland Youth who had worked to raise money to bring a mobile pack event for Feed My Starving Children to Goodland at Max Jones Fieldhouse on Friday and Saturday. This was the first event from that organization to be held in Kansas. Coming to help pack were a mixture of volunteers. A large group of teens came from Weskan to help and students in good academic standing from Grant Junior High came to help. There were also moms with kids and older people.

The process had a job for everyone, no matter their age, said Kevin Ewing, Mobil pack supervisor. The packs done at the Max would go to Haiti or El Salvador.

The core group included Kinsey Volk, Savannah Solomon, Ashley Anderson, Nicole Gerber, Erin Floyd, Savannah Bassett and adult

sponsor Dusti Chadwick. The group raised over \$25,000 to be able to pack 125,000 meals.

Feed My Starving Children is based out of Minnesota and they provide the ingredients to make into a dried food pouch that will feed six. The pack has chicken flavoring, 20 different vitamins and minerals, dried vegetables, soy and rice. The ingredients have been formulated especially for starving children and infants.

Ewing said the world produces enough food to feed everyone on the planet but it is not distributed equally and the poorer countries do not get the correct vitamins and minerals for proper health and growth. He said Feed My Starving Children has helped to cut deaths of children from starvation from 18,000 to about 6,000 a day worldwide.

Ewing and his crew of four others including one very enthusiastic truck driver brought in the ingre-

dients in bulk and the set up for the volunteers to pack the Manna Packs.

The were in separate boxes and a scoop or a cup that measured the correct amount of the ingredients was provided. Each person at an ingredient would dump the correct amount into a funnel which had a bag under it held by someone else. The bag then went to someone who weighed it and did corrections if needed. The final step was a heated bar the sealed the bag. The person running the sealer had to be over 18. Next it went to a person who packed 36 in a box. Other people moved the boxes and kept the ingredients coming.

The organizers try hard to make the event as much fun as possible.

Workers were able to try the food. It was described as tasting like Rice-A-Roni.

City commission gets water overview

The Goodland City Commission received a summary of the city's water system and a rundown of the issues it faces at their regular meeting April 2.

At a previous meeting, Commission Bill Finley had asked the city staff to put together a presentation on the water system, so the commissioners and the public will be better informed should they need to consider conservation restrictions this summer. City Manager Doug

Gerber and Rich Simon, the head of the water department, conducted the presentation.

The city has water rights for 13 wells, they said, nine of which are currently in use. It has 50 miles of distribution lines, 7.5 miles of transmission lines, 1,037 valves, 230 fire hydrants and four water towers.

A water right is a state designated usage amount. Goodland has the right to pump 700 million gallons a year, though it has the right the pump some of its wells more than others. Under Kansas water laws,

Gerber said, if you got their first, the water right is yours. The city actually has the most senior water right in the county, he said.

The city pumped 537 million gallons last year and 441 million the year before. Gerber said due to some wells being inactive, the city can't actually pump the full 700 million gallons, but so far it hasn't needed to.

Simon said the local water table has been declining. In one place, he

William G. Berringer

William G. Berringer, 70, Erie, Colo., 1959 graduate of Sherman Community High School in Goodland, died Tuesday, April 2, 2013, after a lengthy battle with squamous cell carcinoma.

He was born on Aug. 24, 1941, to W.W. and Lois M. (Hooper) Berringer in Goodland. Mr. Berringer was a member of the 1959 State Championship basketball team from Goodland. He attended Colorado State University on a scholarship, was a quarterback for the Colorado State University Aggies football team and was a member of the Air Force ROTC detachment.

On Dec. 23, 1962, he and Judy Peter of Goodland were married. They celebrated their 50th anniversary in December.

After his college graduation in 1963 they began a five-year tour with the U.S. Air Force where he flew C-135s and C-141 Starlifters for the Military Airlift Command. He flew worldwide missions in support of the Vietnam War as an aircraft commander. Mr. Berringer continued serving his country in the Air Force Reserve and began his airline flying career with Western Airlines and retired after 32 years as an MD-11 Captain for Delta Airlines.

He was an avid outdoorsman enjoying elk hunting in the Colorado Rockies, salmon fishing in Alaska and hunting turkey northeast of Goodland. At the Lake House at Lake McConaughy, Neb., he enjoyed family gatherings and water skiing. After retirement he played basketball not only locally but competed globally in men's senior Olympic basketball tournaments.

Mr. Berringer was a member of Rock Creek Church in Louisville, Colo. Preceding him in death were his father, identical twin brother, Warren Berringer, a sister Diane Workman and nephews, Mark McClure and Brook Berringer.

Survivors include his wife of the home; his mother of Goodland; two sons, Todd (Angie) Berringer, of Erie, Colo. and Brett (Heidi) Berringer of Fredrick, Colo.; a daughter, Robyn (Justin) Eisenach of Louisville, Colo.; a sister Judith (J.B.) McClure of Goodland, a sister-in-law, Jan Berringer of Goodland; a brother-in-law, Ernie Workman of Goodland; and eight grandchildren.

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State wants to stop spread of ash borers

In an effort to prevent further spread of emerald ash borer in Kansas, the Kansas Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Agriculture will set 441 traps to detect whether the plant pest is present.

Kansas is participating in the survey to monitor known emerald ash borer infestations and detect unknown beetle populations.

"Emerald ash borer was detected in Wyandotte County in August 2012, but we are hopeful that we do not find any additional infestations in the state," said Laurinda Ramonda, state cooperative agriculture pest

survey coordinator. "These traps are an important monitoring tool. In the event of infestation, early detection would help KDA limit the spread of emerald ash borer."

The purple, prism-shaped traps are coated with nontoxic glue. While they pose no risk to humans, pets or wildlife, the glue can be messy if touched. Kansans are encouraged to report downed traps to the Kansas Department of Agriculture at (785) 862-2180.

The first-ever presence of emerald ash borer in Kansas was confirmed in Wyandotte County on Aug. 29. Since that time, the Kansas

department has implemented a permanent intrastate quarantine for certain firewood, nursery plants and mulch that is shipped in and out of Wyandotte County to prevent further spread of emerald ash borer in Kansas. The quarantine prohibits movement of regulated items from the quarantined area, except under specific conditions established in the quarantine order.

Items under quarantine include the emerald ash borer in any living stage of development; firewood of all hardwood species; ash nursery stock; and green ash lumber.

Emerald ash borer, which is a pest

of ash trees that is native to Asia, was first discovered in North America near Detroit in summer 2002. Since that time, the pest has killed millions of ash trees. Financially, the U.S. risks an economic loss of \$20 billion to \$60 billion because of this pest.

We should not forget that the bond did not pass with a wide margin, just 53 percent of 1,823 voters. The sales tax, revenue from which will go to help fund the school project, passed by an even tighter margin, just 34 votes. That's how it goes in our democratic republic. An issue comes up, both sides argue their points, and then see what where majority of the chips fall. But just because people were on the losing side of an election does not make their concerns irrelevant.

There were a lot of people who were not in favor of the bond issue or the sales tax for a variety of reasons. Some thought taxes are already too high, and raising them would be a burden on consumers, homeowners and businesspeople. Some thought the district's buildings are serviceable enough, and the district should do better at living within its budget. This makes it all the more important for the district to do a good job, to convince those who voted against the measure that the school district is not wasting the money that they did not want to pay in the first place.

The district must take its time and make good decisions, always with an eye toward making the students safer and facilitating their education. From the informational meetings, it seems like they will be conscientious about this. Even before the bond went to the voters there had already been some luxury items taken out of the project.

The district should also be open about the project at every step. Just because the bond and sales tax passed, doesn't mean that should be the end of the community meetings on the project. We have heard several people attribute the win to the district's information campaign. They got the word out about exactly why they needed the money better this time around, and possibly convinced people who were opposed or on the fence two years ago, and they should work to keep those people convinced.

This is a time when the school district must validate the faith the community has placed in it. We've given them the money, now they have to use it wisely. –Kevin Bottrell

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Few compromises in Legislature

I don't know what to say about this past week. Going into the week, we were hoping to have a tax and budget plan by Friday. This did not happen, as the House and Senate were not able to compromise on many key issues. It was very interesting to chair a conference committee for the first time. There are many procedural steps, and to learn the procedures plus working with the other house on bill content was very challenging.

This past week, the House did approve a bill allowing a veteran designation of Kansas driver's licenses and non-driver IDs. Anyone who served in the military and left with an honorable discharge can choose to have "veteran" printed on their driver's license by providing the correct documentation. In addition, the Department of Revenue will share the names and locations of veterans with the Kansas Commission on Veterans Affairs. The Commission will notify the veterans of facilities, benefits, and services available.

There has been no move to change current laws to the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERs). The House did vote and passed-out a measure that takes a big step forward in working to dig Kansas out of the \$9 billion short- fall in the retirement system. HB 2403 proposes to sell \$1.5 billion in Kansas bonds to invest in KPERs. What is pointed out is that we already have the liability side

for KPERs, so this is not new debt for Kansas. What it does do is take advantage of the state's ability to borrow money at low interest rates and use that money to attempt to yield a higher rate of return in other investments. In this case, this effort is about ten percent of the portfolio. The thought is that interest cannot go much

lower, so this is a low-risk way to earn returns that take advantage of current circumstances.

I return to the Capitol for Omnibus on April 28 and 29 for appropriations meetings. We will adjust the budget recommendations, in the House, on bills passed so far this year that have fiscal notes adding cost to the State General Fund.

I am writing this in the House chamber Friday. We have been debating since 10 this morning and it would appear we have many more hours to go. This week I will discuss the important bills that passed both Houses by the end of the evening.

said, the water table has declined from 170 feet to 195.

The city has three conservation levels: watch, warning and emergency. A watch comes with some watering reductions by the city, and encourages citizens to voluntarily reduce their water usage. A warning comes with restrictions for lawns, car washing, pools. Gerber said it is tough on a city, because the police have to go around watching people's water usage. An emergency can include watering bans, rationing and the city can even put on a surcharge for water usage.

These levels are set by the city commission and remain in place until they are rescinded. Gerber

said the city is still under the water watch put in place last summer.

There are other methods of conservation, such as improving the water system, adjusting rates and public awareness. Gerber said improvements to the city water system have reduced water loss from 26 percent in 2009 to 13 percent in 2012.

In other business, the commission:

- Heard from Simon, who said that the city would be trying to help as much as possible to get rid of people's tree limbs starting Monday.

- Held a public hearing on the city's insurance renewal. Charlie Krull with Blue Cross Blue Shield said the renewal was favorable. Krull returned money to the city because the money the city has been able to save exceeds the limit in

the insurance program's reserve fund.

"Not many groups receive 36 percent of their premium reserve back," he said. "Your employees are to be commended."

Krull, who is retiring, thanked the city staff and the commissioners.

- Accepted a bid from TeHe Enterprises to paint and caulk the pool for \$42,000. Gerber said he recommended the Goodland-based company because they were the only one of four bidders who came out to examine the pool prior to bidding.

- Heard that the Arbor Day celebration – which usually consists of a tree planting – will be 1:30 p.m. Thursday, May 2, at Rosewood Park.

The Goodland High School softball team swept the Hugoton Lady Eagles 16-2 and 13-4 in a home doubleheader on Thursday.

The Cowgirls play again today at 3 p.m. (Mountain Time) at Garden City and at 3 p.m. Friday at Ulysses.
