County lifts moratorium on revitalization

The Sherman County Commissioners got input on their Neighborhood Revitalization plan from County Attorney Charles Moser at their meeting Tuesday.

Moser said the county's current plan does not meet the statutory requirements because it is missing two items: a list of the assessed valuation in the proposed revitalization area and a list of all property owners names and addresses in that area. He said these are technical deficiencies that don't necessarily make the plan unlawful.

County Attorney Charles Moser said there have been three opinions on the Revitaliza-

tion Act from the Attorney General's office.

In 1996, Moser said, the Act was challenged as being an unlawful delegation of legislative duties to cities and counties, but the Attorney General's office ruled that it was lawful. A later Attorney General's opinion put in place a requirement that to qualify for the tax break as a dilapidated structure, that condition must exist at the time the plan is put in place.

Another part of the Attorney General's opinions was a requirement that revitalization areas have a predominance of dilapidated structures. Moser said that "predominance" has usually been interpreted to mean an area has a significant number, but not necessarily a majority.

"It would be hard to say that Goodland has a majority of dilapidated structures," he said. "But there are a significant number."

Commissioner Steve Evert asked if the plan could have a cap, so that improvement projects that cost above a certain amount could be excluded. Moser said that it would be possible to include a statement setting a maximum amount in the plan. Treasurer April Hall said it would be important to have that statement in the plan, so that any limits would be applied fairly to all applicants.

Moser said that the 2008 Attorney General's opinion says that most of the specifics are left up to the cities or counties, as long as there are rational reasons for those specifics.

Commissioner Ken Klemm said it appeared to him that the definition of revitalization precluded new construction. Moser said that one of the Attorney General's opinions included a legislative history, and according to that, the Legislature's intent when creating the law was to help with things like stabilization, housing shortages and and to help municipalities increase their tax base. Many communities, including Goodland, have a shortage of entry-level housing, Moser said, and the Act can help stimulate new housing development.

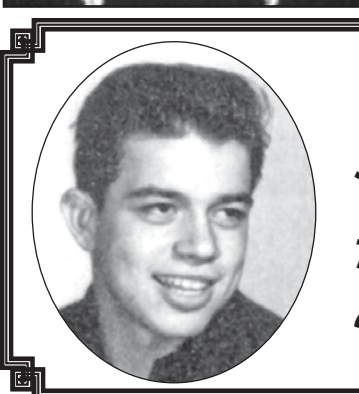

Why Kansas needs a Farm Bill now

This fall, Congress has an important opportunity to create jobs and grow the economy by passing a long-term, comprehensive Food, Farm and Jobs Bill. The Farm Bill impacts every American, every day by providing a wide range of programs that strengthen our nation.

The Farm Bill is crucial to maintaining a strong agriculture sector and an abundant food supply that benefits all Americans. Over the past two years, producers have faced a multitude of disasters – from drought, to flooding, to blizzards. These events demonstrate how important the safety net is to keeping producers going strong. Under the 2008 Farm Bill, the Farm Service Agency was able to provide \$464,816,552 in disaster assistance to Kansas farmers, ranchers and landowners using Farm Bill programs.

A new Food, Farm and Jobs Bill would provide a strong crop insurance program, reauthorize the now-expired disaster assistance programs, and provide retroactive assistance for livestock producers. By reforming the safety net to eliminate the direct payment program – which pays producers whether or not they are in need of assistance – the Food, Farm and Jobs Bill would also save billions of dollars in the next decade.

In addition, it would allow the Agriculture Department to continue export promotion efforts that have led to the best five-year period in agricultural trade in American history, and provide FSA with the tools to extend additional farm credit in Kansas.

The Farm Bill is also a job creation bill that would empower the department to partner with rural communities to grow, expand and support new businesses.

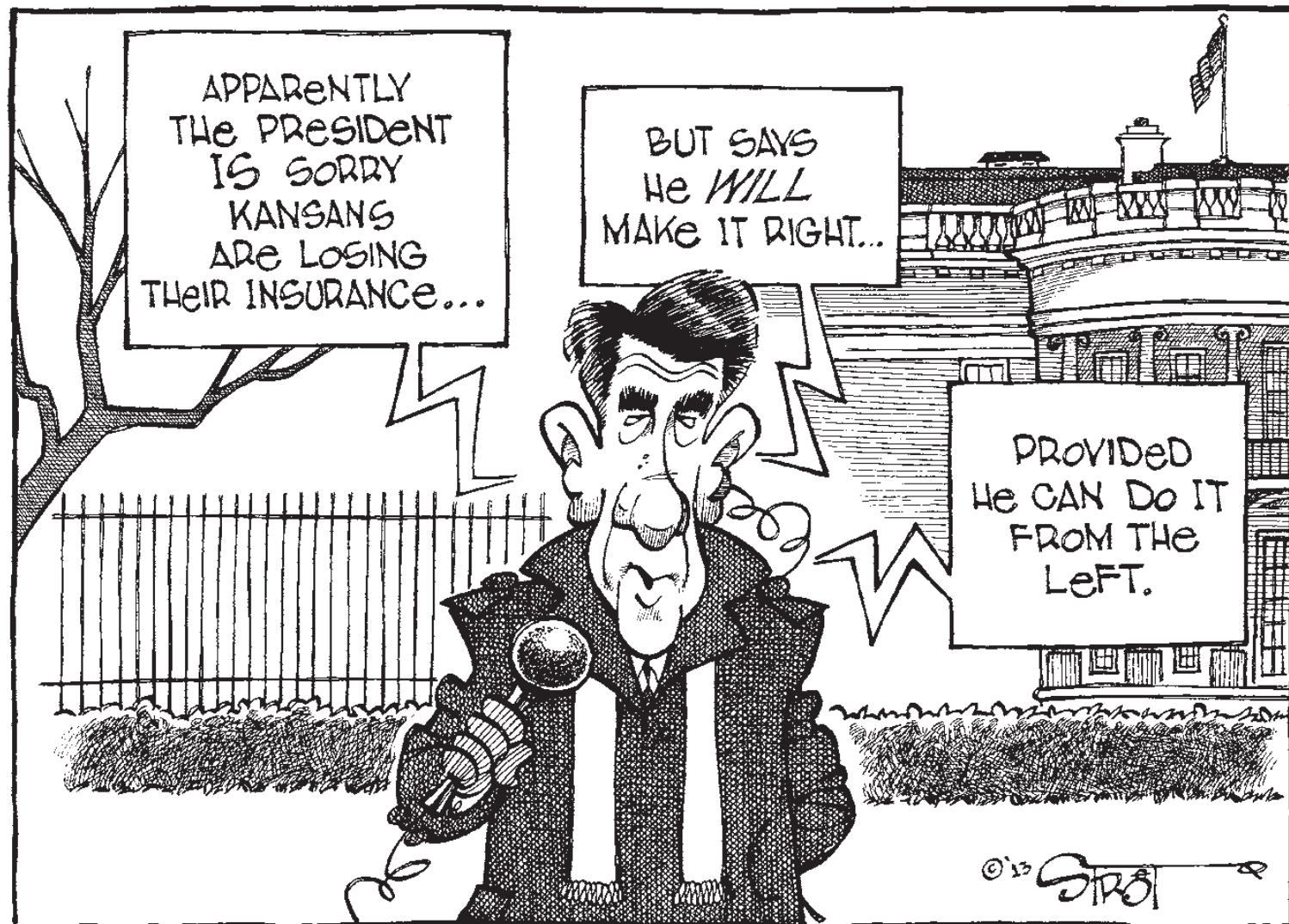
A new Food, Farm and Jobs Bill would help Main Street businesses grow and hire more, strengthen infrastructure in our small towns and provide new opportunities in biobased product manufacturing and renewable energy. For example, in Kansas, U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development has provided funding to nearly 200 projects since 2009 that help farmers, ranchers and rural businesses save energy through the Rural Energy for America Program. This and many other efforts could continue with a new Farm Bill.

A new Food, Farm and Jobs Bill would make important investments in nutrition programs that provide critical assistance to vulnerable Americans, including children, seniors, people with disabilities who are unable to work, and returning veterans. It would enable the department to continue our work with more than 500,000 producers and landowners to conserve the soil and water. It would undertake new strategies to improve agricultural research, and it would ensure a safe food supply.

All of these efforts strengthen our nation. A new Food, Farm and Jobs Bill would continue the job growth we've seen in recent years and help grow the rural economy. That's why President Obama has identified passage of a new Farm Bill as one of his top three legislative priorities this fall.

This is a prime opportunity to give America's farmers, ranchers and producers the certainty they need about the next five years of U.S. farm policy, while investing in the rural communities that stand at the heart of our values. The Farm Bill has stood as a model of bipartisan consensus for decades and it is high time that both Democrats and Republicans come to a compromise on this new Farm Bill. It is our hope that Senate and House conferees will reach a consensus quickly and move a Farm Bill forward as soon as possible.

Small business Saturday

In his Thanksgiving proclamation, President Washington began with the following words: "Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor."

This week we should stop and give thanks to God for the many blessings we enjoy as Americans. I am thankful that despite the policy failings in Washington, we still live in the greatest nation on the face of the earth.

After gathering with family and friends to celebrate traditions, make memories, and give Thanks this week, your mind may shift to Christmas shopping. As you do, I want to call attention to key members of the small towns we call home – our small businesses. Not only do small business owners create jobs across the First District, but they are often our community leaders and our little league coaches as well.

Most small businesses employ fewer than 10 people. Many small business owners do their

books late at night at the kitchen table after their kids have gone to sleep. They do not have an army of lawyers, accountants, and lobbyists to keep up with all of the changing rules and regulations coming out of Washington.

And far too often, Washington is more interested in what happens on Wall Street – rather than Main Street. And that is just backwards. Small businesses account for about half of the total economic activity in America. They create nearly two out of every three new jobs. They have historically led our nation back from recession. Strengthening our small businesses is vitally important to get our economy moving forward and putting millions of Americans back to work, many of whom have given up

on finding a full time job.

As a member of the Small Business Committee, that's why I am sponsoring a bipartisan resolution in Congress to call attention to the importance of small businesses in our communities. It would denote the Saturday after Thanksgiving as "Small Business Saturday." It is only a symbolic measure, but it would serve as a reminder as to how important our small businesses are to our nation.

I also encourage you to join me in doing something more than symbolic. After giving Thanks on Thursday, please join me in shopping at a small business this Small Business Saturday. These businesses, their owners and employees, are the backbone of our American economy. Not big businesses. Not special interest lobbyists. And certainly not Washington.

May God bless and protect you, your family and our entire nation – both on Small Business Saturday – and the entire year.

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Whose back yard?

"Not in my back yard!" is the protest heard when waste dumping is being negotiated. This concept, abbreviated NIMBY, is easily illustrated by the Central Interstate Low Level Radioactive Waste Compact that was established in 1985. The states of Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska agreed to decide on the best site to store the low level radioactive wastes generated in medical and other activities. But when the "best" site ended up being in Nebraska, that site went to court and ended up being removed from the pact in 2004.

A similar NIMBY occurred nationwide when the Yucca Mountain Nuclear Waste Repository in Nevada was found to be the best deep geological repository storage facility for highly radioactive wastes. This agreement was designated by the NWPA Amendments in 1987 and approved by Congress in 2002. But again, NIMBY protests by Nevada, the site of Yucca Mountain, brought that effort to an end.

That does not mean that our national need went away. Just last year, a U.S. Department of Energy commission stressed the urgent need to find an equivalent geological repository. But the requirement that it must have the input and approval from the citizens around it ensures

that our "not in my back yard" attitude will prevent any U.S. radioactive waste repositories.

The other side of the coin is the IMBY principle where everyone wants resources and "goods" in our back yard.

In Kansas, we had the Brownback plan, approved by our Legislature, that waived state income taxes for five years for anyone moving from outside Kansas to any of 50 rural counties.

Far more egregious has been Texas Governor Rick Perry's highly publicized aggressive efforts to steal jobs from other states. This "in my back yard" strategy may appear to be good politics in Texas, but Governor Perry can kiss goodby to running for United States President again. Both Democratic and Republican governors are protesting his efforts that make his state richer by making their states poorer.

A real statesman looks at the whole picture – for the benefit of all.

Finally, Missouri Governor Jay Nixon has called for a moratorium to the Kansas-versus-Missouri tug-of-war. Each state has been trying to attract business to cross to their side of our common border, to the detriment of the other state.

At the international level, we want to import rare earths we do not have in order to manufacture our new media electronics, from cell phones to laptops. A few years or even months later, they wear out and we ship these devices with hazardous components to some impoverished African country. We want the goods of the world brought to our back yards, but we then dump them as wastes in other's back yards.

There is something missing in our educational system when such selfishness is considered legitimate. Virtually every culture has some version of the golden rule: if you don't want it done to you, don't do it to others.

Whether it is Kansas-versus-Missouri, Texas-versus-the-rest-of-the-U.S., or the U.S.-versus-the-world, it is time we learn that for both resources and wastes, everyone's back yard is our back yard.

County lifts moratorium on new neighborhood revitalization applications

vided by Moser, the county could move forward on any Neighborhood Revitalization applications it has pending through the rest of the year, and in the meantime work on revising the plan for next year.

"We can do this," Evert said, "but make sure it show a benefit."

The commissioners voted to lift the moratorium on approving applications, and said they plan to outline what they want to change in the plan for next year at a future meeting.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Had a visit from Randy Hrabe from the

Northwest Kansas Planning and Development Commission about the micro-loan program. Sherman County is one of the higher loan loss programs, Hrabe said, mainly because there hasn't been good follow up with the loan holders over the years. Hall said the county has been starting to take some action on the defaulted loans.

Klemm said his feeling was that the micro-loan program was taking money from taxpayers and using it for high-risk, unsecured loans with poorly defined collections.

"Some of these businesses are just gone," he said. "Isn't that proof that the design wasn't good?"

Hrabe said the program was designed to give out loans that banks wouldn't. Sheridan County has had many successful businesses start up with help from the program, he said. Hall said she has looked at the applications for some of the Sherman County loans, and said for many there were little or no business plans filed.

There is still money available for micro-loans, which can be used to leverage other funding. Hall recommended getting a fresh start by setting up a new committee to better scrutinize the applications. Klemm agreed, saying that there should be a clear system, due diligence should be done before the loans are given out and that there should

be better follow up with the loan holders.

• Discussed the tax tale with Hall. The sale is for properties with outstanding taxes for three years. Klemm asked if the process was going according to the timeline. Hall said the commissioners would have to decide whether to sell properties on the list for the amount of the taxes, or for whatever people are willing to bid.

The process for this sale has taken several years. The commissioners are looking to do a yearly sale. Hall provided a list of properties that would be on a sale for next year, but said there are many that owe under \$10 and wouldn't be worth the abstracting fee. She said she had been looking at timelines

for other counties that do yearly tax sales and said the process should take about nine months.

Hall said that the county doesn't have to wait three years to sell properties that are abandoned. That can be done with one year of unpaid taxes.

• Voted to replace the three drinking fountains in the courthouse with reverse osmosis systems from Culligan. These systems will filter the tap water at the courthouse and put it into a tank from which people can fill cups or bottles.

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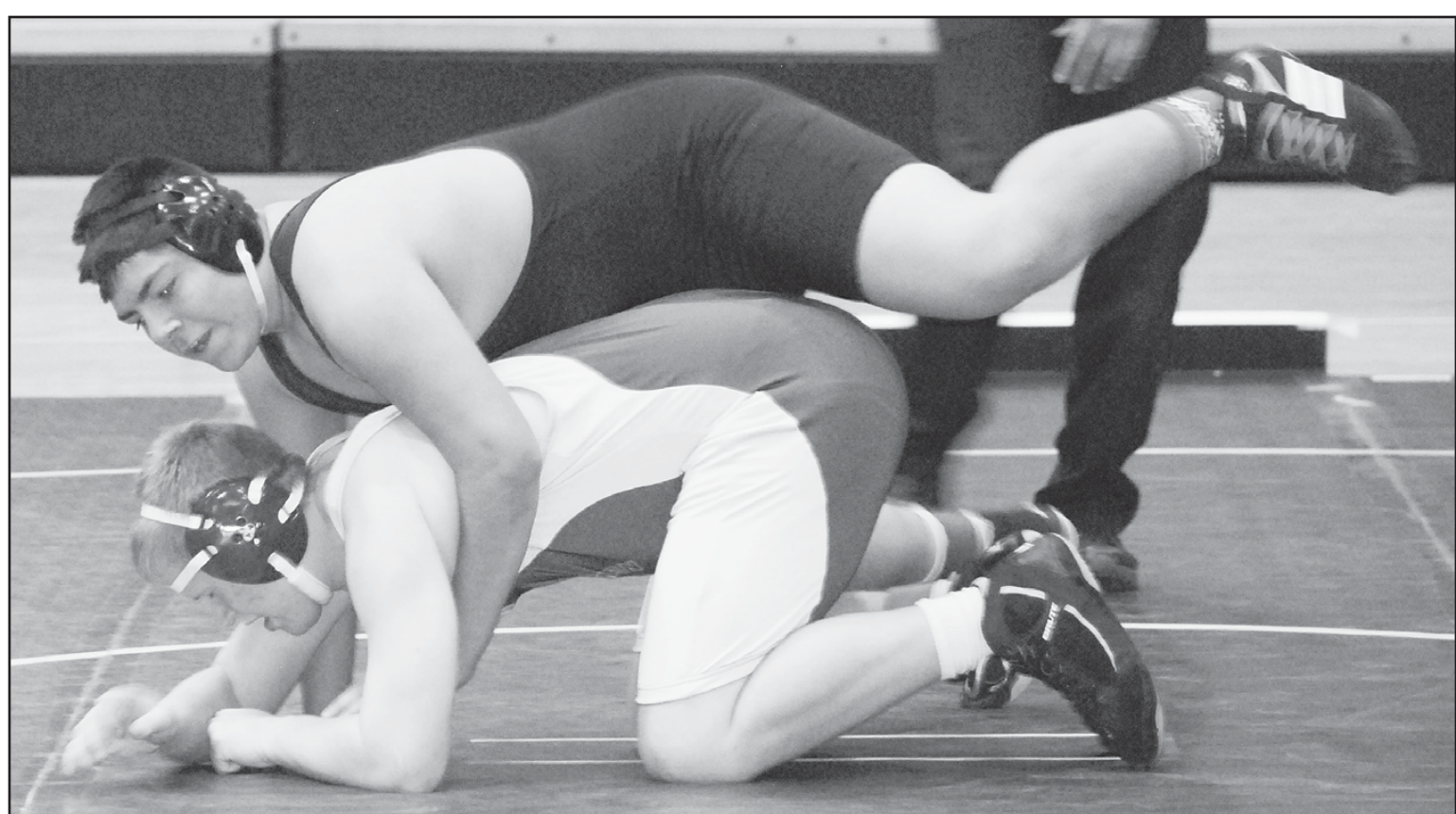

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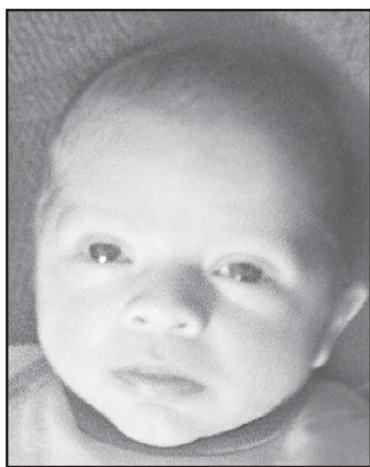

“One of the most common risk factors for COPD is a history of smoking,” said Robert Moser, state health officer. “While never smoking is one of the best ways to reduce your risk of COPD and other chronic diseases associated

with smoking, for those who smoke, quitting now will help reduce your risk. Use a date as your stop date. Going though change is easier with a partner or in a group, so recruit others to join you in your plan to quit smoking. In addition to quitting smoking, talk to your health care provider about testing for COPD, as early detection and treatment can

help manage the disease.”

When Kansans are ready to quit using tobacco, the Kansas Tobacco Quitline is ready to help online at www.KSquit.org or by phone (800) 784-8669. The quitline is a service provided at no cost to Kansas residents. Enrollment is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week (except major holidays) online or

by phone.

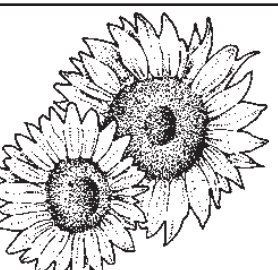
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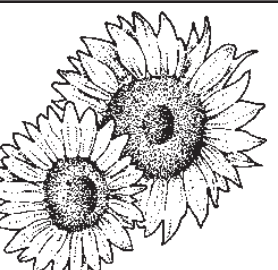


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Garden City woman liaison with group

What do we do with our equipment after the electricity has temporarily been off? The answer is, we power up. Today in the conclusion of a two-part series, we'll learn about a remarkable young woman who is giving leadership in various ways across the state — including a group known as PowerUps.

Liz Sosa is a young professional in Garden City. As we learned last week, she grew up at Hugoton and is manager of a small business in Garden City. She also plays several other roles, professionally and as a volunteer. All of these might be described as community spirit or

civic engagement.

"I learned it from my parents," Liz said. "My dad was a speech pathologist and my mother is a high school English teacher. They were both civically engaged." They were deeply involved in clubs, activities, church and community.

"My parents set the example early on," Liz said.

For Liz, her first big civic undertaking was when a friend was hired to work on the Main Street program in Garden City. Liz got involved as a volunteer and ultimately served as vice chair of the board.

Liz later got involved with a group called Public Square Communities which we have previously profiled. Founded by Terry Woodbury, this organization seeks to rebuild communities by connecting

leaders through dialogue and action. The Public Square process involves people from four sectors: business, education, government and human services.

Liz became a community facilitator for the Public Square process in 2011. Terry Woodbury retired as chief executive officer and is now a project advisor. In September 2013, Liz was named chief executive officer for Public Square Communities. Jeanette Siemens of Pratt serves as chief operating officer and Liz Hendricks of Howard serves as chief financial officer.

Liz maintains her volunteer activities as well. In 2011, she graduated from the Leadership Kansas program. In 2012, she served as local program chair for the Garden City Leadership Kansas session. In

2013 she became the state program chair, and will serve again in 2014.

Several years previously, Garden City hosted the annual Kansas Sampler Festival. Wendee LaPlant from the Garden City Convention and Visitors Bureau did such a good job of working with the festival that she ultimately became assistant director to Marci Penner at the Kansas Sampler Foundation.

Marci and Wendee care deeply about rural Kansas. They started brainstorming about how to involve young citizens and the future of the state. All too often, young people are not asked to be involved in the leadership of rural communities or are invited as a token voice of youth.

In June 2009, Marci Penner convened a meeting of young people to discuss this topic. What followed

might best be described not as a formal organization but as a movement, a gathering of young people now called PowerUps. These are young people who are described as rural by choice. In other words, they have lots of alternatives for locating their homes or careers but choose to live or work in a rural setting.

For example, PowerUps are found in rural communities such as Wamego, population 4,220; Eureka, population 2,940; Clearwater, population 2,173; Alma, population 785; Claflin, population 691; and Lucas, population 427 people. Now, that's rural.

As we have previously profiled, PowerUps are persons ages 21 to 39. Rural persons age 40 and up are called PowerOns. Sparks are those people younger than 21 who aspire

to be Power Ups.

Liz Sosa is active in the PowerUp movement. In fact, she is the PowerUps liaison with the Kansas Sampler Foundation. For more information about these organizations, go to www.publicsquarecommunities.com and www.ruralbychoice.com.

So what do we do with our equipment after the electricity has temporarily been off? We power up. In other words, we restart our equipment and bring it back up to operating strength. In a similar sense, our communities can make a fresh start by engaging the ideas and creativity of our young people. We commend Liz Sosa and all those involved with the PowerUps for making a difference with their involvement. These PowerUps can generate a lot of energy.

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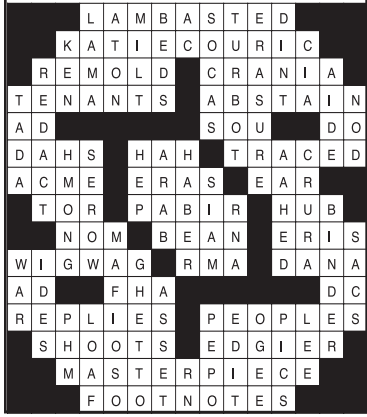

Mavericks win home opener against Clarendon

The Northwest Kansas Technical College men's basketball team won a tense home opener Tuesday night, beating Clarendon College 95-92 in a game that came down to the last few seconds.

Next action for the Mavericks will be at 4 p.m. today against Casper College and 1 p.m. Saturday against Air Force Prep. Both games will be at the Northeastern Junior College campus in Sterling, Colo.

On Tuesday, neither team scored on their first possession. Jackson Hussey passed the ball to Johanel Caraballo in the paint, who put it in for the first two-pointer of the game. Gian Clavell added a three pointer to put the Mavericks up 5-0.

Clarendon scored their first two points to make it 5-2. Marcus Walden hit a jump shot for two points, then rebounded a shot by Hussey and put it in to make it 9-2. Clarendon added two, the Clavell hit another three pointer to increase Northwest Tech's lead to 12-4.

After a timeout, Clavell made another three pointer. Hussey added two, then Clavell got hold of the ball when it was knocked out of a Clarendon player's hands. He took it down the sideline and made a slam dunk. The Bulldogs put in a two pointer to make it 19-5.

James Sylvester put in a pair of two pointers to make it 23-8, but Clarendon answered with five points, closing the gap to 23-13 with 12:44 left in the half.

Walden was fouled while shooting and put in two free throws, then Caraballo made a two pointer. The Bulldogs scored to make it 27-15. With 10:57 left in the half, Hussey put in a two pointer. Sylvester added a pair of free throws, answered by four from Clarendon to make it 31-19.

Caraballo put in another two pointer, then Oshey Washington rebounded his own shot and got the putback for his first two-pointer of the game. A moment later he caught a pass from Hussey and put in a three-point shot to make the score 38-19.

With 5:59 to play in the half, Walden put in a two pointer. The Bulldogs got a pair of free throws, then Sylvester hit a two-point shot to make it 42-21. The Bulldogs added four points before Washington was fouled and put in two free throws to make it 44-25.

Clarendon put in two consecutive three pointers, making the score

44-31. Clavell scored, then the Bulldogs put in three free throws to make it 46-34. Clarendon got another three pointer, but Clavell hit two free throws to end the half with the Mavericks up 48-37.

Caraballo scored the first two points of the second half, but the Bulldogs got another pair of three-pointers, cutting the Mavericks' lead to seven points. Clavell put in a two pointer, and Sylvester added a free throw to make it 53-43. Clarendon scored, then Clavell put in a pair of free throws to keep it at 55-45. Over the next five minutes, the Mavericks increased their lead to 70-53, but then the Bulldogs started to fight back. Clarendon went on an eight-point run, closing to within nine points of the Mavericks.

Walden hit a fadeaway jumper to make it 72-61. The Bulldogs answered with two points, then Caraballo put in a free throw. Clarendon made a three pointer and with nine minutes left Caraballo made another free throw to make the score 74-66.

The Bulldogs went on another run, scoring six points before Sylvester got a putback. Clarendon put in a three pointer, making it 76-75.

The Mavericks stayed ahead with two free throws from Sylvester, but then with six minutes to play, the Bulldogs tied the game at 78-78.

Washington put in a two-point shot, but the Bulldogs got a three pointer, giving them their first lead of the game. The teams traded the lead back and forth for several minutes. At 1:17 on the clock, the score was tied up 89-89 on a free throw by Caraballo. He got the lead back for the Mavericks with 31 seconds to go when he missed a free throw, but got the rebound and put it in for two points.

With 28 seconds remaining, Sylvester put in two free throws to make it 93-89. Caraballo made another free throw, but Clarendon

put in a three pointer with seven seconds on the clock, closing back up to 94-92. Sylvester added one more free throw to make it 95-92. Three more fouls were committed in the last six seconds, but none of the free throws went in. The Bulldog's last-gasp half-court shot went wide, giving the Mavericks the 95-92 win.

Home wrestling meet is Saturday

For the first time, the Northwest Kansas Technical College women's wrestling team will show off their skills for a home crowd at the Beauty and the Beast Duals starting at 9 a.m. Saturday at the Larry Keirns Fitness Center on the college campus.

The men's team will also be wrestling. Competing schools coming to town for the event will include Midland University from Fremont, Neb., Lindenwood Belleville University from Belleville, Ill., and Wayland Baptist University from Plainview, Texas.

The Lady Mavericks have been to three competitions so far this season. At the Cliff Keen Duals in Oklahoma City on Oct. 25 and 26, they went 2-5, ending up in eighth place. At the Jamestown Duals in Jamestown, N.D., Lily Trinh placed first at 101 pounds and Teasia Lizama placed second and 130 pounds.

Justina Luafalemana placed eighth at 191 pounds at the Missouri Valley Duals in Marshall, Mo., on Nov. 16. An event in

Winnipeg, Canada on Nov. 8 and 9 was cancelled.

The men's team has had a lot of success so far this season. The Mavericks defeated Pratt Community College 24-21 in the first match of the season on Oct. 26.

Mavericks shut out Wentworth Community College 53-0 at home on Oct. 31, then went on the road, beating Neosho County Community College 25-18 on Nov. 2 and Arkansas Baptist 39-9 on Nov. 8.

They also competed at the Dan Harris Open in Baldwin City on Nov. 3. Victor Haro placed first at 141; Bryce Carr, first at 174 pounds; Tyler Hinton, second at 141 pounds; Cameron Huizar, fourth at 125 pounds; Dominic Bejarano, fourth at 184 pounds; and Floyd Jones, fourth in heavy-weight.

On Nov. 9 the Mavericks placed second at the Mustang Duals in Conway, Ariz. The team beat the University of Texas-Arlington 47-0 and Central Baptist College 39-9, but lost to Campbellsville University 34-11.

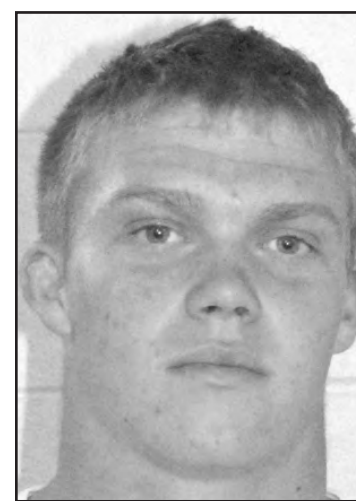
Goodland graduate makes all-conference
