## 2014 election season is under way

The 2014 General Election season is now under way, with several statewide racing gaining national attention.

The Primary Election is Aug. 5 and the General Election Nov. 4. To be in the August primary, candidates have to file by noon June 1. Independent nominations are deadlined at noon Aug. 4.

Locally, the First District County Commissioner seat — currently held by Larry Enfield — is up for election. The district includes all of Goodland Ward 3 and Ward 4 south of Sixth Street as well as Itasca, Washington, Union and Iowa townships.

The Sherman County Attorney position is also up for election. Because current County Attorney Charles Moser took over in the middle of a term, he has to run in the next general election.

Both the 120th District in the Kansas House of Representatives and the 40th District in the Kansas Senate are up for election. As of Monday morning, no one has filed in either district.

Also on the ballot this year is one U.S. Senate seat, all four seats in the U.S. House of Representatives, governor and lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, state treasurer, insurance commissioner, State Board of Education District 5, two supreme court judges, eight appeals court judges, district court judges and district magistrate judges.

**Governor**

While incumbent Gov. Sam Brownback has not officially announced an intention to run for re-election, his campaign raised more than 1.6 million last year. Brownback was elected in 2010. Prior to that he had been a U.S. Senator.

Brownback will face declared Democratic candidate Paul Davis. Davis currently serves as the Minority Leader of the Kansas House of Representatives, a position he has held since 2008. He represents the 46th District, which covers eastern Lawrence.

Davis is a University of Kansas graduate with a degree in political science. He earned a law degree from Washburn University. His running mate is Jill Docking a Wichita investment advisor and former Kansas Board of Regents member.

Two Libertarian candidates have also declared an intention to run: Tresa McAlhaney a retail manager and Wyandotte County Libertarian Party chairperson; and Keen Umbehr, a lawyer and former business owner from Alma.

**U.S. Congress - 1st District**

Congressional incumbent Tim Huelskamp was first elected to the House in 2010, beating six Republicans and one Democrat for seat left open by Jerry Moran's run for the Senate. Huelskamp was unopposed for re-election in 2012. He had been a member for the Kansas

State Senate. Huelskamp has resonated strongly with Tea Party conservatives, but often found himself on the outs with the House leadership, having been removed from several committees including Agriculture.

Huelskamp is facing Republican primary challenges from Kent Roth and Alan LaPolice. Roth is an Ellinwood native with a business degree from the University of Kansas and a law degree from Washburn University. He served from state Legislature from 1976 to 1982.

LaPolice served in the U.S. Army during the first Gulf War. He graduated with a degree in performing arts from the University of California Berkeley and worked as an actor and an English teacher. He moved back to Kansas in the early 2000s.

Former Manhattan City Commissioner and Mayor Jim Sherow announced last week he was interesting in running for the Democratic nomination. Sherow attended Wichita State University and holds doctorate from the University of Colorado. In 1992 he joined the history department at the University of Kansas. He also served as a domestic radio operator in the U.S. Air Force from 1970 to 1974.

Democrat Bryan Whitney — a 27-year-old Wichita State graduate with a degree in political science — has also announced an intention to run. Whitney hails from Syracuse.

**U.S. Senator**

One U.S. Senate seat from Kansas is up

for election this year. Incumbent Pat Roberts has indicated he plans to run for re-election. A Topeka native, Roberts has served in the Senate since 1996. Before that, he served in the U.S. House of Representatives for 16 years. He is a graduate of Kansas State University and served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1958-62.

Roberts' most notable opponent so far is Dr. Milton Wolf, who is challenging him in the Republican primary. Wolf is President Barack Obama's second cousin. He is from Lyons and currently works as a radiologist in Kansas City.

So far Wolf has gained the support of several key conservative groups including The Madison Project, a Washington D.C.-based organization that raises money for conservative candidates. However, Roberts has never garnered less than 60 percent of the vote in Kansas elections.

Shawnee County District Attorney Chad Taylor is considering a run for the Democratic nomination. Taylor announced last year that he was planning a "listening tour" to examine potential support for a campaign. He has served as district attorney since 2008.

Aaron Estabrook, who lost an election for the Kansas House of Representatives as a Democrat in 2012, is seeking election to the U.S. Senate as a Moderate Party candidate.

Earl Franklin "Dusty" Rhoads, Meritorious Service Medal. 95, Surprise, Ariz., 1936 graduate of Sherman Community High School of Goodland, died Monday, Jan. 20, 2014.

He was born on Oct. 14, 1918, to Frank J. and Margaret (Hopper) Rhoads at home in Goodland. Growing up in Goodland he worked on his parent's farm and attended the local schools.

In 1942 at 24 he enlisted in the Marines and retired honorably as a Lt. Col. in January 1972. While in the Marines he served World War II (Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands, Green Island), Korea and two tours in Vietnam. He was involved in the Cuban Missile Crisis as well as the Bay of Pigs incidents. While serving he earned the National Defense Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Medal, Presidential Unit Citation, World War II Victory Medal, Korean Service Medal, United Nations Service Medal, Korean-Presidential unit Citation, Bronze Star, Bronze Star with Valor, Vietnamese Service Medal, Vietnamese Campaign Medal and

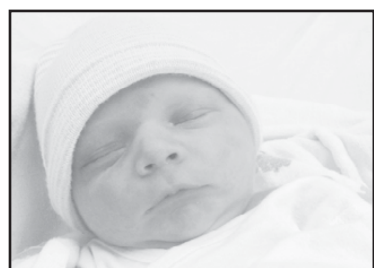

# Mobile lab used for students

Acime has been committed. The team of analysts is hard at work, extracting DNA from crime scene evidence. Is this a high tech lab at the FBI? Or maybe a scene from a Hollywood CSI show? No, none of the above. In this case, the crime was that somebody stole the cookies. The team of analysts is a group of students from rural Kansas. They are using real-world science on this project and learning a lot in the process.

Brenda Edleston is dean of the Geary County campus of Cloud County Community College. A life-long educator, she was a teacher and administrator in Arkansas before coming to Kansas. Her husband, Rob Edleston, is president of Manhattan Area Technical College.

In 2006, Brenda came to the Geary County campus of Cloud County Community College and worked her way up to become dean. The campus in Junction City has been there since 1996. The central office for Cloud County Community College is in the rural community of Concordia, population 5,548 people. Now, that's rural.

In 2010, the college joined a project called TRAC-7. TRAC is an acronym for Technical Retraining to Achieve Credentials. The 7 refers to the seven educational institutions that came together in this project: Washburn Institute of Technology, Cloud County Community College, Dodge City Community College, Salina Area Technical College, Garden City Community College, Flint Hills Technical College, and Highland County Community College.

This consortium received a \$19.6 million grant from the U.S. Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration to help build a more skilled workforce statewide.

"They were looking for institutions with unique programs," Brenda said. Each member of the consortium brought their unique programs to the table. The grant supported providing these unique courses online as well as through specialized mobile units for hands-on training.

Altogether, the consortium includes online classes in advanced systems technology, electrical power technician, power plant tech-

nology, environmental technology, food science, risk management, and agri-biotechnology. This last one is the one from Cloud County Community College, taught by Cathy Troupe.

In addition, the TRAC-7 grant provided for mobile labs to complement the online classes with experiential learning. "Watching and doing are two different things," Brenda noted. "Virtual participation in the classes is a precursor to the hands-on experiments in the mobile laboratory."

So Brenda and her staff set out to design a mobile lab for the biotechnology program. "We started with a sheet of notebook paper and a ruler and a pencil with a good eraser," Brenda said with a smile. They designed a laboratory on wheels - essentially, a camper with slide-out sides and high-tech equipment inside. New Horizons RV in Junction City was the successful bidder to construct the project.

"We were so pleased to be working with a local firm, and they have done a terrific job," Brenda said. The mobile unit has twelve student work stations, each with linked computers and a microscope, plus two incubators and a fume hood. In this facility, students can do experiments such as extracting DNA from lab samples under the supervision of an instructor. One instructor designed a mock scenario where somebody took some cookies and the students are to analyze the DNA so as to identify the culprit. That might be useful around my house - except it would eliminate my deniability.

Currently the mobile unit is being taken around the state for demonstrations. Microbiology and biotechnology lab classes will be taught in this facility beginning in fall 2014.

"Adult learners tend to be placent," Brenda said. "We can broaden everybody's opportunities if we can go to where the students are."

## Rural Center supports broadband

The Kansas Rural Center applauds the decision to postpone indefinitely a hearing on Kansas Senate Bill 304, which would prohibit cities and counties from building public broadband networks.

According to the *Wichita Eagle*, Sen. Julia Lynn, R-Olathe, chair of the Senate Commerce Committee, postponed the hearing indefinitely due to "concerns" she had heard in the previous week, and to provide industry representatives with time to gather public input.

"SB 304 appears to be a major step backward in the efforts of Kansas and our local communities to grow our own future in ways that best suit local needs," said Julie Mettenburg, executive director of the Rural Center.

Adds longtime Rural Center board member and rural advocate Charlie Griffin, Manhattan: "This will have the effect of putting rural citizens of our state in the hands of large-scale commercial providers, who may have little reward for provision of the excellent service coverage needed."

Rural areas often lack the critical mass to attract big national providers and present many barriers to successful system development. As has been the case with rural telephone providers, it often requires partnerships and creativity to bring in effective access.

The accessibility of broadband internet connection is central to rural economic development and community development strategies. It has been a vital aspect of rural telemedicine and telehealth strategies across our nation, efforts that bridge professional resources which are often in short supply outside urban communities with needs in rural communities. These bridges provided by accessible broadband fuel local development opportunities and maintain local health services' very existence.

These efforts often depend on local government cooperation or in some cases are the responsibility of state and local governments, such as the health and human service provision.

In addition, broadband internet connection is crucial given the rapidly developing role of technology in agricultural production systems. The need for connections from the combine or tractor cab or the computer on the farm kitchen cabinet to mass data systems is growing rapidly.

## Lottery Act discussed by House

In the Appropriations Committee last week, we discussed the Kansas Lottery in detail. I learned that if you don't buy a ticket, you have little chance of winning, and I have never bought a ticket.

There was a comment that a lady in Florida found a ticket on the ground while leaving a supermarket, kept it and won several million dollars. That being said, here are some facts about the lottery.

The Kansas Lottery started in November 1987; through June 30, 2013, ticket sales have produced more than \$1.4 billion in revenues transferred to the state.

The Kansas Lottery Act requires that a minimum of 45 percent of total sales be paid back to the players through the prize fund. Last year, however, it paid out 56.6 percent in prizes. The

lottery had \$244.8 million in sales, and \$74.5 million was transferred to the state.

The State Gaming Revenues Fund gets monthly transfers from the lottery. Transfers are then made from the Gaming Fund to funds dedicated to economic development initiatives, prison construction and maintenance projects, juvenile detention facilities, problem gambling assistance, and the state General Fund.

What many people are not aware of is there are also Kansas Lottery Veterans Benefit tick-

ets. Net profits from Veterans Benefit games go directly to designated veterans programs. Every penny is used here in Kansas and goes to provide basic assistance for our Kansas military veterans.

My problem with all gambling is there are too many people who are using more than their discretionary dollars. I spend my discretionary dollars hunting and playing golf. If people want to gamble, fine—just don't make it a problem where you are hurting those around you.

I introduced a bill in Transportation that will give a name to highway K-161, which runs north to Benkelman, Neb., from Bird City. The Cheyenne County Historical Society requested the highway be designated at the "Ancient Indians Trader Trail." I see no problem in this bill passing.

## Ms. Wheelchair Kansas honored

The Kansas Senate presented a resolution to Angel Shaver, Ms. Wheelchair Kansas 2013, on Jan. 29, Kansas Day.

### Mortgage Registration Fee

The Senate Assessment and Taxation Committee is considering SB 298, which would repeal the state's mortgage registration fees. This fee discriminates against Kansans borrowing money to purchase a home, business or land. Buyers paying cash are not required to pay this fee, which can range from several hundred dollars for home buyers, to thousands for purchasers of commercial real estate or agricultural land.

The inequity of this tax is probably unfair

to borrowers who are charged the fee. Farm Credit Systems are not subject to this tax. The Tax Committee is supporting a more reasonable approach to funding the needs of county Register of Deeds offices across Kansas.

Part of the compromise on SB 298 would phase out this tax over five years and would consider increasing what counties now charge for recording mortgages and other documents filed with county registers. This is a controversial issue without an easy solution. Kansans deserve a transparent fee law that is fair to all borrowers.

## New racing season could be interesting

The 2014 Formula 1 season got under way the last week of January with the first round of pre-season testing in Spain.

Now, still being a newbie at this racing business, I don't really know how indicative the first pre-season test is of how the season will go. I expect it's like other sports. The Rockies' first Spring Training game may not tell you much about how the whole season will turn out, but you can still make some observations.

There were a lot of interesting things going on. The big change from naturally aspirated V8s to turbocharged V6s has shaken up the playing field somewhat. Everyone has new cars, which also come with new looks, something that has been somewhat controversial. The last few years, F1 cars have had a nose that is level with the steering wheel. This year new safety regulations forced the teams to have lower noses, and that has resulted in some interesting, and frankly ugly, designs.

All the F1 journalists latched on to the poor showing by Red Bull, who won just about everything last year. They only managed 21 laps due to problems with their new car, while Mercedes and other teams managed several hundred.

Two of the biggest surprises – for me at least – were McLaren and Williams, who consistently set fast times in their new cars. McLaren it seems has a rookie driver that could be a force to be reckoned with. Kevin Magnussen drove very quickly, as did his teammate, former world champion Jenson Button. Williams and their new driver Felipe Massa also distinguished themselves.

The other top tier teams, Ferrari and Mercedes, set very fast lap times as well.

I've decided to split my loyalty this year between Lotus and Force India, following my

two favorite drivers. Romain Grosjean, driving for Lotus, showed massive improvement in the second half of the 2013 season and if they give him a good car, he's be very competitive. I'm becoming a Force India fan this year because of driver Nico Hulkenberg, who moved there this year. He was the one driver who last year more than any other kept me glued to the screen.

Force India didn't necessarily distinguish itself in the first test week, but didn't do badly either. Lotus didn't have their car ready for the first week, but has since got it in working order and is testing it as I write this on Friday.

One of my other favorite drivers, Kimi Raik-

onen, is now at Ferrari, but I just can't bring myself to support that team. I would not be disappointed if he did well though. Ditto for the McLaren and Williams teams. Those two have such a rich heritage that I hate to see them struggle like they did last year.

I decided to try my hand at driving by getting the Formula 1 2013 computer game. So far I'm pretty terrible. The best I've managed to get (on the easiest difficulty level) is one second-place finish. The best thing about the game is that it has a "historical mode" where you can drive cars from the 1980s and 1990s.

Also, if you get the chance, I highly recommend the movie "Rush." It came out in theaters last year and is now out on video. It tells the story of the rivalry between 1970s Formula 1 drivers Niki Lauda and James Hunt, culminating in Lauda's horrible accident and subsequent return to racing. It is brilliantly directed by Ron Howard and is sure to entertain even those who are not really interested in racing.

He is a U.S. Army veteran and works as a case manager for homeless veterans in Kansas.

Scott Barnhart is seeking election as an independent. A teacher and farmer, Barnhart lost the Democratic primary for the U.S. House of Representatives in the 2nd District in 2012.

### Secretary of State

Incumbent Kris Kobach will be running for re-election as Kansas Secretary of State. A Republican originally from Madison, Wis., Kobach was first elected in 2010.

He holds a law degree from Yale and taught at the University of Missouri-Kansas City.

Two Democrats have declared their intention to run.

Randy Rolston of Lenexa is a businessman and co-founder of Victorian Trading Company. He holds a bachelor's degree in graphic design, architecture and art history from the University of Kansas.

Jean Schodorf of Wichita is a former Republican. She served as a member of the Kansas House of Representatives from 2001-2013, changing party affiliations after being defeated in the 2012 elec-

tion. She is a former Kansas Board of Education member and holds an bachelor's, master's and doctorate in communicative disorders.

### Insurance Commissioner

Incumbent Kansas Insurance Commissioner Sandy Praeger is not running in the 2014 election. Four Republican candidates have expressed interest in the open position: El Dorado insurance agent David Powell; accountant and corporate executive Ken Selzer; insurance auditor and state Rep. Clark Shultz; and businessman and activist Beverly Gossage. So far Powell is the only one to have filed.

### Attorney General

Incumbent Derek Schmidt has not yet declared whether he will run for re-election as Kansas Attorney General. Thus far no other candidates have declared.

### Treasurer

Ron Estes is running for re-election as Kansas Treasurer. No other candidates have declared yet.

Estes is a former Sedgwick County Treasurer and worked several private sector industries. He holds a bachelor's degree in civil engineering and a master's of accounting degree from Tennessee Technological University.

The Cowboys were open at 220 and 285.

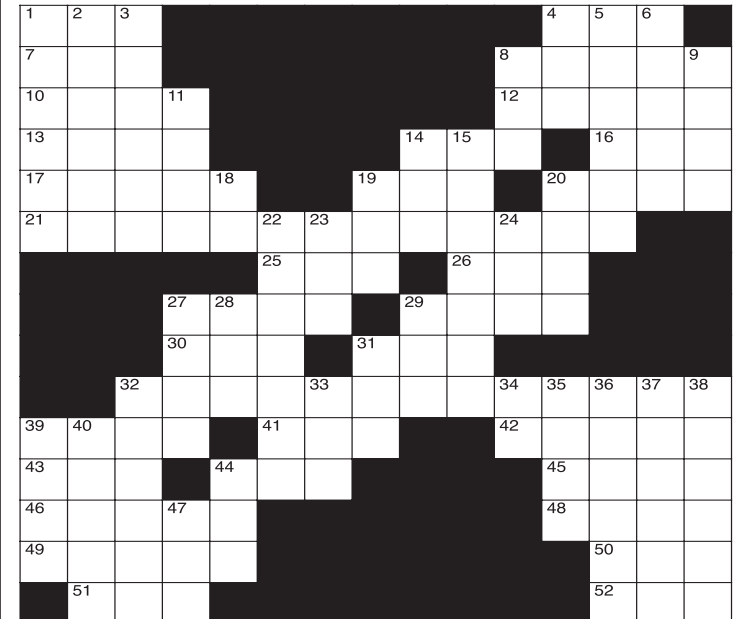
